Unravelling the Giant Snail Origin at Totara Reserve

Horizons Regional Council are seeking community insight into Powelliphanta marchanti snails found in Totara Reserve Regional Park and how they came to be there.

Horizons biodiversity advisor Ruby Mountford-McAuley says in 2017 several large snail shells were found in the reserve, and last winter a live snail and shell were also sighted.

"To date we're not sure how the Powelliphanta marchanti may have found their way into Totara Reserve, so we are putting it out to the community to see if anyone knows of events in the past that may have led to their presence," she says.

"Over the years we've heard a few theories including the possibility of a live snail been washed down from the Ruahine Ranges, where they are usually located. There is also the possibility a remnant population is recovering due to increased animal pest control in the reserve, or that someone has left a live snail there at some stage.

"We thought it was worth seeing if anyone had any information to strengthen these or other theories. We're certainly keen to figure out how they may have got here and if other sightings occur."

Ms Mountford-McAuley says the shells found to date were identified by national snail expert Dr Kath Walker.

"Powelliphanta marchanti are one of our most threatened invertebrates and are prone to predation by rats, hedgehogs, pigs and possums. They are a medium sized snail with a maximum diameter of 54mm, and have a yellow-brown shell.

"Winter is the best time for Powelliphanta marchanti spotting, as the wetter weather causes the snails to become more active, so if anyone sees any, please note the location, take a photo and let us know. However, please do to not remove them. Powelliphanta marchanti and their shells are legally protected under the Wildlife Act."

Letter From the Editor

Hello and welcome to the July Issue of the Village Voice.

Our cover story is regarding the Powelliphanta snail. This genus is endemic to New Zealand and is one of the largest in the world. They are carnivorous and can live up to 20 years. If you do a search on Youtube you can find videos of them eating worms. They also eat slugs.

According to the Department of Conservation there are sixteen species and 57 subspecies of Powelliphanta, 40 of which are ranked as being of National Conservation Concern. Threats to Powelliphanta are habitat loss and predation by introduced species such as hedgehogs, possums, rats and pigs.

Powelliphanta snails lay 5—10 eggs per year. Given the numbers, they are facing an uphill battle.

This is where we can help. Start trapping. By trapping we can give our native animals a chance to not only survive, but also increase in numbers. It is also not difficult.

We have an amazing organisation here in Ashhurst called RECAP and they have a trap library. You can borrow a trap, set it up in your back yard and help catch introduced species that are destroying our native wildlife. This is one of the most effective ways of assisting our community's conservation efforts.

As we go to print The Garden Bird Survey is underway (25th June—3rd July). Everyone is encouraged to take one hour to look and listen for birds and record the highest number of each bird you are able to identify. This helps identify whether predator control is working. While it will be too late to take part by the time you receive this issue, you may like to take a record and then see how that changes after you start trapping.





Community Comment *continued* damage in the Domain, but the damage was limited to this small area of the town in an unpopulated area.

City Council arborists have been busy in our reserves. An overgrown plum tree at the Library was trimmed down to size and a cherry picker was needed for the bigger job of pruning the phoenix palm at the Plunket Park. The playground equipment at the Plunket Park is also undergoing repairs and maintenance. This includes replacement of timber and slide on the fort, a bigger new slide to challenge youngsters and a spinner to make them giddy with excitement. Parents will also be happy to hear that the playground will also be fully fenced.

The City Council is looking to extend its residential zones to match the city's demand

for more housing. Under consideration is the land west of the city to Longburn, an extension of housing along Napier Road and in and around Whakarongo, along with a big increase of space to the east of the Aokautere village. Ashhurst is still in the mix with a rumoured increase of up to 400 sections in the four new residential zones proposed for the village. Ruahine Kiwi and RECAP TrAP Library Update

Ruahine Kiwi update

Great progress is being made on the project with over 1,000 traps deployed. A great run of weather has helped the two teams of three spend a large amount of time out in the field. The number of hedgehogs caught at the start was mind boggling. With Winter upon us, their numbers have dropped off, and the rat numbers are catching up. Mustelids (ferret, stoat and weasel) are the project's main target species, and the monitoring needs to show that the mustelids are at low levels before we can reintroduce kiwi. Thanks for the support from the local farmers.

The project's aim is to reintroduce kiwi to the Southern Ruahine in 2026.

RECAP TrAP Library Update

Seventy residents have over 300 traps on loan. Materials have arrived for a further 60 traps and the library will have over 450 traps once they are ready.

Candidates who wish to lead Palmy over the next three years can now officially put their hands up. Nominations to stand as a Councillor or Mayor for Palmerston North City Council open on Friday, 15th July and close at 12.00pm on Friday, 12th August.

Lacewings—The Gardener's Friend

Lacewings are small, winged insects that are good friends of the gardener because they prey on a range of plant pests, including aphids, white fly and psyllids. Most of the lacewings found in New Zealand belong to the family known as Brown Lacewings which have semi-transparent wings. They account for more than 60% of the New Zealand-wide lacewing observations on Council's website. the iNaturalist website. More than 80% of my own lacewing observations in and around Ashhurst have been Brown Lacewings.

Because they are rather small, often less than 10 mm long, they are not easily seen on plants. Most of the ones I have observed have actually been in our house porch, perhaps attracted by lights at night.

Lacewings continued

There are several species, most of which have arrived here from Australia and further afield. Two examples of introduced Brown Lacewings, Micromus tasmaniae and Psectra nakaharai, both of which are common locally, are shown in the photos.

We do have one native species of Brown Lacewing called Micromus bifasciatus but it is not at all common. I have found it only twice, both times on native trees, and there are only six observations of the species nationally on iNaturalist. In appearance, it looks similar to Micromus tasmaniae.

The next most common family of lacewings in New Zealand are the Green Lacewings which also have semitransparent wings. However, they do not

will continue to move earth whenever weather permits following the approval of the project's winter works consents by Horizons Regional Council.

Winter works consents are common practice on infrastructural projects featuring significant earthworks, such as Te Ahu a Turanga, which has a total of six million cubic metres of earth to be moved over its duration. The consent allows for certain earthworks activity to take place over winter, with appropriate measures in place to prevent erosion and maintain sediment controls during times of increased rainfall.

Our environmental teams are a crucial component of this work, as they manage the monitoring and maintaining of the many sediment control devices along the alignment, and help to stabilise areas where work won't be happening over winter to reduce the risk of erosion and sediment run off.

Throughout winter last year, our earthworks team were able to move about 400,000 cubic metres of earth. They'll be aiming to get as many cubic metres moved as possible this winter but they'll also focus on maintentance work on equipment in preparation for the construction ahead.

Rain days present our mechanics with the chance to do maintenance and repair work while the machinery isn't required onsite.

Work on the project's six structures will largely continue across the winter. Two of the minor structures, Bridges One and tTen, are structurally complete and piling works on the Parahaki Bridge and the Eco Vaiduct are well advanced. Work is underway on the Bridge Five underpass and planning is ongoing for Bridge Seven.

As mentioned in the previous edition, our landscaping teams are in full swing as winter is the time when they do the bulk of their work. We're looking to plant more than 530,000 plants this season to complement the 250,000 planted last year. Multiple helicopter flights will take place over the next few months, as the teams transport the plants across the multiple planting properties.
