#### Tetrapaks Now Recyclable

Avid almond milk drinkers and juice feigns can now tread a little lighter on the planet, thanks to the Council's new recycling service. Teaming up with SaveBOARD, the Council has introduced a new drop off point at the Ferguson Street recycling centre, where people can recycle their used food and drink cartons, or other forms of liquid paperboard.

Council's Group Manager of Resource Recovery, Bryce Hosking, says liquid paperboard is often known as 'Tetrapak' and is used for long-life milks, juice, stock and other food items found at your local supermarket.

"Residents and businesses can now drop off their used Tetrapak food and drink cartons at the Ferguson Street Recycling Centre during opening hours. This is a real milestone for Palmy as up until now, this sort of packaging has been sent to landfill."

Liquid paperboard packaging is typically made up of several different materials which are difficult to separate. For years there was no option to recycle this type of packaging within New Zealand, and so it was either sent to landfill or sent offshore. This means all recycling from Palmy continues to be recycled here in New Zealand."

Mr Hosking asks that people follow a few steps to prepare their used cartons for recycling.

"Please open and flatten each carton and make sure they're clean and dry. Then drop it off in the appropriate bin at Ferguson Street. This will ensure there is no contamination before being shipped off for processing."

Thanks to this partnership, Council will be further reducing waste to landfill and by recycling these food and drink cartons, residents will be doing their part in protecting our planet.

At this stage, liquid paperboard cartons can't go in your kerbside recycling, so these must be taken to Ferguson Street.

between residential and commercial landowners. Many of the submissions were particularly concerned for those on fixed incomes such as pensioners, for which a rates increase of over 10% will be particularly difficult in these times of high inflation. Big increases in property valuations in Ashhurst have resulted in proportionally higher rates increases here. Larger sections incur even bigger valuation increases due to the perception they can be subdivided for multiple properties (and rates). Ratepayers on low incomes may wish to apply for assistance

under the rates rebates scheme.

The local body election cycle will soon be upon us, and election signs will appear on fences near you. Contenders will be considering their options, getting their billboards printed and developing their campaign strategies. Nominations open from 15th July-12th August and postal voting concludes 6th October. about information sessions for candidates are likely to appear soon if you are interested in serving as a representative on one of the local Councils.

#### The Southern Ruahine Kiwi Habitat Restoration Project

The Southern Ruahine Kiwi Habitat Restoration Project is managed by Environment Network Manawatu via a collaboration between Manawatu River Source to Sea and Te Kauru Eastern Manawatu River Hapu Collective. The project is funded by The Department of Conservation Jobs for Nature initiative and aims to control predator pests in 13,000 ha of the Southern Ruahine Ranges, with the dream of returning Kiwi to the area by 2026. The project is delivered in

alignment with neighbouring predator control projects in the area, presenting a fantastic opportunity to return a taonga species to a significant proportion of the Ruahine Ranges.

Advantage was taken of the good weather over the last couple of months to groundtruth and increase the quantity of traps in the Ruahine Ranges. The project is logging traps, traplines and kills on the Trap New Zealand website (www. trap.nz). 1049 traps have currently been set and are being monitored and repositioned to ensure that they are at their most effective. The project uses a combination of Department of Conservation 150 double traps, AT220s and Goodnature A24's.

The project is grateful to be supported by The Egg Project who have a scheme where you can donate eggs via their website for our traps. We use hundreds of eggs a month which comes at a considerable expense and are thrilled by the public response to this. You can find out more at www.theeggproject.co.nz.

The Praying Mantis

Do you know how many species of Praying Mantis we have in New Zealand? The answer is two.

Probably many of us will be familiar with our native species, which has the name *Orthodera* novaezealandiae.



In fact, prior to 1978, it was the only species present in New Zealand. Regrettably, around that time, another species arrived here from South Africa and has found our country to its liking.

The South African Mantis, known as Miomantis caffra, tends to be larger

than the native species, especially the female. Her egg-laden abdomen can appear grotesquely inflated before she lays down her egg-case. The egg-case itself is somewhat larger, and more untidy looking, than that of the native mantis.

Whereas our native mantis is always bright green, the South African species is more variable in colour, though usually brown or green. Probably the easiest way to tell them apart is by the width of the thorax, the long collar between the abdomen and the head. The native mantis has a wide flat thorax whereas, in the introduced species, the thorax is much thinner than the head and abdomen (see photos).

Another difference between the species is that the native mantis has a

distinctive blue patch on the inside of both front legs. The South African mantis has only a few black spots on the inside of the forelegs.

The South African Mantis was first found in Auckland but now seems to have spread throughout the country. That means both species can be found in Ashhurst, as well as the wider Manawatu. The successful establishment of the introduced mantis is bad news for our native mantis because it competes with it for food and habitat. And worse, the male New Zealand Mantis seems to be attracted to the female South African Mantis which then often eats the male. As a result of these factors, it appears that the new arrival is slowly but surely replacing the native mantis in our gardens and forests.

This newly published memoir is the amazing story of Ruth—who she was, who she became, and how she came to own two tiny, colourful bookshops in the remote little village of Manapouri in Fiordland.

And what a story—it's a vivid and emotional telling of a life lived to the full (and beyond), both reckless, exciting, puzzling and all true! There is nothing remotely mundane or ordinary about Ruth and her very rich life, at least until recent times, when she and her husband Lance finally found each other again and settled on a life in little Manapouri.

We learn of her very sad experience as a teenager, which seemingly led to her restless and unhappy early years. This traumatic event, we can see as readers, brought about many wrong choices and uncertainties but certainly wild adventures.

She sailed the Pacific for years, sometimes as a young woman alone, other times part of a crew. There were clashes with pirates and many other dangerous incidents. Many years were spent in Papua New Guinea working as a cook and running a restaurant, and some in Sydney's Kings Cross working with drug addicts and

prostitutes in a collective environment. There was also a very short stint as an escort.

Many were the broken relationships, jiltings (hers) along the way, she often mentions the feeling of not being worthy of happiness. Her parents were often afraid for her safety, and she often deliberately cut contact with family and friends while on her overseas adventures.

One incident while in Tahiti stands out when, after being arrested for illegal card games and gambling (having no money left), the local Gendarme phoned her father in New Zealand. When asked if he would pay for her airfare back to New Zealand he replied "No, she can look after herself!". "That's right—I can" she replied.

A much more settled life awaited her in New Zealand in later years, not least when she finally meets her son, adopted out as a baby, as so many were in those early days, as a young man to be proud of and learns of his happy upbringing with great parents.

Ruth reunited with her first love, Lance, and it seems like this true story does finally have a happy ending.

#### Amlaku's Ethiopian Update

Since my last article back in February, things have moved on significantly. With all the stolen machinery, including the grain mill, replaced, life for the people of Baregota is, relatively speaking, back to normal, even if it's a bit of a new normal. They were able to plant cash crops of vegetables late in February and are harvesting and selling these now in order to clear their fields for the main cereal crops which are due for planting at the end of May. Our appeal for funds for seed and fertiliser almost reached its target, thanks to the generosity of some very committed supporters.

There is still no electricity in Lalibela, although construction of a new power line from the south has started. This will take until well into next year to be completed, so until then people like Amlaku rely on generators to power things up.

He is busy manufacturing his soap and detergent materials, while the Days for

Girls sanitary kits are also being made again. Sales come and go, because of the economic chaos caused by the civil war, but at least his soap and detergents materials need replacing every few weeks, thus ensuring continuing market.

Some incredibly exciting things have happened from our end this year in terms of the project. I have been looking to find a way to bring

the project to a conclusion because of my advancing years, and also because, apart from the civil war, we had pretty well accomplished all we had dreamed

Now a way forward for Bricks for Life is emerging, and I would invite you to a Special General Meeting to be held on Saturday, 18th June at 2.00pm in St Mary's Magdalene's Anglican Church Hall, Cambridge Avenue to hear about

Afternoon tea will be provided, but we would appreciate people bringing a plate to help with that.

So, do join us, to find out about:

- Two boys getting a home of their own in Addis.
- Amlaku getting a vehicle for his soap business.
- An exciting future for the project, widening the agricultural work out into neighbouring villages.

#### Waka Kotahi New Zealand Transport Agency Update

Te Ahu a Turanga: Manawatu Tararua Highway reached a significant milestone in May, hitting the 3 million cubic metre mark for earthworks moved across the site.

This is about half of the project's total earthworks volume, and is a fantastic achievement by the team, especially considering the challenges posed by COVID-19 and inclement weather in recent

As is usual for major projects, the earthworks activity will slow down over the wetter months. However, the teams will continue to move earth whenever possible following Horizons Regional Council's approval of our latest winter works consent.

While the drier, summer months are ideal conditions for earthmoving, the opposite is true when it comes to planting. This is

because the rain loosens the earth, making it easier to get plants in the ground, while also providing a better environment for them to grow.

About 250,000 locally sourced riparian and wetland natives were planted in the 2021 season and more than 570,000 are expected to be planted in the second season, which began in May.

As part of the project's ecological offset programme, nearly 2 million plants will be planted along the highway and at five offset sites throughout the region across the duration of the project.

The accessibility of many these sites is limited so our planting teams often have to make their way to them on foot. The timing of the season also means they are often working in challenging weather conditions, so we are extremely lucky to have a team who are incredibly dedicated and passionate about what they do.

Planting will also be taking place on Parahaki Island, under the guidance of the Parahaki Island Trust, including Trustees



#### Kia ora tātou

A big thank you to Village residents who made submissions on Palmerston North City Council's annual budget.

We received huge written feedback on our spending proposals, and 340 people chose to speak to their submissions over nine sessions held last month.

With an awareness that across-the-board rising costs are impacting household budgets, Councillors are considering these responses with all care and diligence as we look to set rates for the 2022-23 financial year by the end of this month.

#### **Caring community**

Thanks also to the RECAP volunteers for their weekly food distribution efforts, which along with the seed library, community garden and sharing shelf, are based out of the Ashhurst Library garden.

I understand the demand for the pre-packed food parcels has been heavy, and RECAP members are now seeking sponsorships from businesses to meet the growing need, while asking for further donations of food, produce and household items.

I also commend members of Ashhurst's River Church for their regular free and wellsubscribed community meals.

#### Te Āpiti Masterplan

Last month the Te Āpiti Governance Group released its masterplan for Te Āpiti Manawatū Gorge.

Based around cultural, environmental, recreational, educational and leadership values, the masterplan provides a policy framework for proposals and projects to be delivered over time.

As well as the potential use of the old Gorge highway that was permanently closed in 2017, it includes enhancement of existing walking and riding trails, while adding new tracks and bridges.

The exciting proposals include a 200-metre long 'skybridge' across the Manawatū River and possible UNESCO Geopark status.

It will lead to Ashhurst becoming a bustling destination hub for trail walkers, runners and bike riders.

#### Te Āpiti book

It's timely then to remind residents about Michele Frey's book Te Āpiti Manawatū

Gorge, published by Te Āpiti Governance Group. That Covid prevented us from formally launching the book in Ashhurst was unfortunate, but copies are available from the Community Library, with a hard cover RRP of \$59.99 and \$39.99 for soft cover.

#### Te Ahu a Tūranga

Last month saw a major milestone on the Te Ahu a Tūranga Manawatū Tararua Highway. Since it began in January 2021, some three million cubic metres of soil, half the six million cubic metres total, has been shifted.

The \$650 million project, due to open by the end of 2024, is now roughly one-third the way into its construction.

There has been a delay, however, in bringing the Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency drivethru simulation of the completed highway to the Ashhurst Community Library, but that shouldn't be too far away now.

#### **Village Valley Centre**

The Village Valley Centre reroofing project has been completed and the refurbished facility is open for bookings.

For the Cambridge Ave medical centre, material and construction hold-ups have pushed the opening date back to August.
