Waka Kotahi New Zealand Transport Agency Update

The Te Ahu a Turanga: ManawatuTararua Highway has completed its first earthworks season, with over 650,000 cubic metres of earth moved since construction began in January. Thanks to a relatively mild winter and a seamless COVID-19 shutdown and restart, the project began its second earthworks season this month in a strong position.

During Level 4 the site had to close except for essential maintenance. With stringent safety plans in place, Te Ahu a Turanga was one of the first major projects to resume construction in Level 3 and the site is fully operational in Level 2.

Lonnie Dalzell, Regional Manager Infrastructure Delivery Central North Island, says a big focus this year has been creating access for construction. A lot of this work is nearing completion and with access largely in place across the site, the coming earthworks season is about moving a lot of dirt.

"Over 10% of the project's total earthworks has been completed and we are working towards having half the project's total earthworks moved by the end of the current season, in May 2022."

Te Ahu a Turanga is one of the largest earthworks projects in the country and has around 120 pieces of large machinery onsite, including a Wabco 353 elevating scraper—one of the biggest scrapers in the world.

Mr Dalzell says pleasing landscaping progress has also been made. "The landscaping team has been out in all weather and has met their goal of getting close to 250,000 native plants in the ground at two farm sites before the warmer weather arrives. Around 630,000 plants are growing at a number of nurseries for planting next year."

The project team has grown to around 220 people, including subcontractors, and there are a number of jobs to be filled. There are opportunities for labourers, apprentices, field technicians, diesel mechanics, and multi-skilled earthworks machinery drivers. Job vacancies are listed on the *Te Ahu a Turanga website: nzta. govt.nz/projects/te-ahu-a-turanga/jobs.*

Mr Dalzell says that while earthworks production is business as usual, the project's Visitor Centre on Napier Road in Ashhurst is closed for the time being due to COVID-19. "We are monitoring the situation and will reopen to the public as soon as it is safe to do so. In the meantime, you can see the latest progress by checking out our latest flyover online."

Big Changes at St Mary Magdalene Anglican Church

Ashhurst locals may have noticed a lot of activity at St Mary Magdalene Church on Cambridge Avenue with surveyors, builders and painters currently working on the church and in the grounds.

This is only a start of the exciting things to come.

The parish, over the next couple of years, will embark on an exciting programme that will not only benefit the church and parish but the Ashhurst community as a whole.

Phase One

First the church itself with the support of Heritage New Zealand and a bequest from the descendants of the original architect, Frederick de Jersey Clere, is in the process of being re-painted in a heritage white to both preserve this cherished building and to better mark its identity as an historic building and an Ashhurst landmark.

Phase Two

Then the next step will be for the parish to carry out much needed upgrades to the hall with an overdue new roof, new windows and a refreshed interior and frontage.

Phase Three

The hall will then be extended by thirteen metres, replacing the old Sunday School with a building comprising a new modern kitchen, toilets showers, bigger social area, prayer/meeting room and south facing deck. This will provide a much needed modern and hospitable space for both the church and our wider village community.

Along with those community groups currently using the hall it is envisaged that it will be ideally suited to wedding parties, family gatherings, and other village events that a larger hall may not be suitable for.

Phase Four

Social housing in the church paddock.

The plan is that the paddock between the church and fire station will, in partnership between the Parish of Pohangina and the Anglican Diocese of Wellington, be developed with social housing comprising of one and two bedroom units.

These rental units are aimed at older parish and Ashhurst residents who may be currently living alone in larger two or three bedroom homes, thus freeing up much needed and sought-after family size homes in the village.

These changes will take place in stages over the next couple of years as accessing both tradesmen and materials is a challenge for everyone in these COVID-19 times.

We hope you are all as excited as we are about these changes and look forward to your patience and support as it all unfolds.



Book Review—To Be Fair: Confessions of a District Court Judge

To Be Fair: Confessions of a District Tra Court Judge by Rosemary Riddell. mo

Rosemary Riddell describes, with humour and empathy, her former career as a Family Court and District Court Judge in New Zealand.

She was a late starter, career-wise, becoming a lawyer at 40 and later serving as a judge on the bench. As a part-time judge, Rosemary travelled around New Zealand on an as-needed basis and has only recently retired. After much persuasion and many refusals, she decided to write of her experiences as a judge. She comments that, as a retired judge, she can say what she likes and, in her view, "some things need to be said".

The other aspect of her story is a more personal one and we find how she can relate to others in her professional life because her family have known and lived through some of the very sad events that turn up in court.

There are chapters relating to her opinions on Mental Health, Sentencing, Property Disputes, Custody Tussles, The Poverty



before the rush of Christmas is upon us.

Our streets and footpaths have suffered some damage in past months from the weather, increased traffic and their heavy loads. Installation of the broadband fibre



Community Comment *continued* network infrastructure has added some additional challenges to our footpath routes with new ditches appearing around the town.

Good news at last with many of the potholes in streets now repaired and footpath damage fixed with new seal or concrete. The road structure problems on the State Highway 3 detour section of Cambridge Avenue have been identified, branded, and awaiting remediation. Even the garden beds around the new raised street platforms have been given a makeover. The gardeners have also transformed the wilderness of Whitten Reserve back into a pleasant seating area.

If everything goes to plan, domestic connections of broadband fibre should be rolled out and operational before the end of 2021.

The Council cannot fix problems it does not know about. The latest mobile app, used by many councils, is called 'Snap Send Solve' and makes it easy to notify the relevant Council of any particular issue so they can get it fixed. Just open the app, select a category from a set of problems, add a quick photo and a short description and send it on its way. Available from your standard app store.

The pressure of housing availability

is rising along with their prices. Local bodies are struggling to meet the demand for more residential building sites. At government level, Labour and National have jointly announced their support of a new bill for "Enabling Housing Supply". This will require Tier 1 Councils (ie. five biggest cities) to adopt Medium Density Residential Standards (MDRS) from August 2022. These new standards "will enable landowners to build up to three homes of up to three storeys on their site as of right". Councils will now be re-jigging their plans to they can cope with the increased infrastructure capacity which will be required for this type of infill housing.

Not so bad you may think, if it was restricted to the big urban centres, but this extends to the suburbs as well. An Order in Council (effectively a Cabinet decision) can require Tier 2 Councils such as Palmerston North to adopt the same planning rules, "if the area is experiencing acute housing need". These measures will add pressure on Palmerston North City Council for higher density housing and to make more sections available.

"Times, they are a-changin". We can only hope that we can help guide the changes ahead so that we can live in an environment we can enjoy.

Amlaku's Ethiopian Update—Amlaku's World Goes Belly-Up

Almost a year ago, in my last report on our journey with Amlaku in Ethiopia, I started by quoting Robbie Burns—'The best laid schemes o' mice an' men gang aft a-gley'. COVID-19 had messed up his budding tourism business, and that continues to be the case. However, his soap-making business grew rapidly, as did the Days for Girls menstrual products business. There was a huge demand for both lines.

But there were dark storms brewing. In November 2020, the Federal Government sent troops into the Northern Region of Tigray, immediately above Amhara Region, where Lalibela is. Long complicated history here, but Tigray was asserting its semi-independence to the degree that the Government believed it really had to try to bring them back into line. A short sharp incursion was planned to take out the rebel leadership and deal to The Tigrayan Peoples' Liberation Army, a well-armed and battle-hardened force which had largely been responsible for getting rid of the previous Communist Government-The Derg-back in 1991. Things were pretty grim over the next few months, with some really bad humanitarian stuff happening, with the Eritrean Army coming across the border to add to the chaos, with existing refugee camps in the Region being

unable to access food, and so on. Just horrible. In June 2021 the Federal Forces withdrew—a 'humanitarian ceasefire' so that the Tigrayan farmers could plant their crops. However, the Tigrayans regrouped, and sent their forces south—into Amhara (where Lalibela is) and also the Afar Region to the East. Lalibela came under siege late in July, with only the Amhara militia standing between the town and the Tigrayan Peoples' Liberation Army forces.

Amlaku, using his just-purchased van (for the soap business), was working with the Town Council, collecting food from the town, and delivering it to the militia on the front line, when, on 5th August, the Tigrayan Peoples' Liberation Army snuck around Lalibela and literally walked into the town from the other side-occupying it without a shot being fired. Amlaku was with the Town Council members at the time, and he and they just had to run, otherwise they would have been shot. I finally got hold of him three days later and discovered that they had walked for eight hours before catching a bus to Bahir Dar, the regional capital, about 200 kilometres from Lalibela. We were able to send him some money, which enabled him to buy some clothes and food, and ultimately get down to Addis, where he remains. To

date (21st October), he has had no contact with his family in Baregota Village, or his friends and workers within Lalibela itself, as all phone and internet connection has been cut, along with electricity supplies to the town. The town itself is apparently OK, thus far.

With a new Government being announced at the beginning of October, Federal Forces are at last pushing back against the Tigrayan Peoples' Liberation Army. They are meeting stiff resistance. Fighting is going on over several fronts. If the Tigrayan Peoples' Liberation Army do retreat, it will be in the direction of Lalibela, which really is the spiritual heart of Ethiopia, so for them to hold it is very significant. With thousands of people killed already in this conflict, we can but hope and pray that Lalibela can be retaken without being destroyed, or its people killed.

The causes of this conflict are regional, tribal and very complex, with the issues going back for generations. The tragedy of it is that it risks undoing not only everything we have done over the past 12 years in Baregota and Lalibela, but also all of the advances the country has made over the past 30 years.

Amlaku remains in Addis, where, with funding from here, he has been looking after a group of around 50 refugees. Thirteynine of these are in Addis, with the rest in towns in Amhara. Nine are girls and seven children, probably young teens. All have had to flee their homes with absolutely nothing but what they were wearing, and probably their phones!

So far, we have been able to send him about NZD\$25,000, money which he is using very carefully. The group (we call them the G50) mostly have relatives or friends they can stay with, but they still need feeding, so he has linked them up to a number of cheap restaurants, where they are able to get three basic meals a day. Amlaku pays the restaurants one month at a time. What he is providing is only a drop in the ocean of need, but it is helping these ones—like the well-known starfish story.

Amlaku continues to amaze me with his resilience, his optimism, his faith in God, and his desire to help those most desperately in need of support—like these two girls he met recently.



He wrote: Dad, these girls are from Lalibela. I knew them personally, and they fled from Lalibela three days after the Tigrayan Peoples' Liberation Army seized my beautiful town, and they have spent a month in Dessie. However, because of the increased number of people displaced from their homes following the war now arriving in Dessie, it was challenging to meet their basic needs, so they decided to come to Addis. I met them on 20th August. I bought them clothes, and they are some of the people receiving support from you and from our benevolent New Zealanders.

He has also helped these three young men.



He wrote: These lads made a six days walk from Bilibala to Bahir Dar. It was their parents who forced them to flee their home, fearing the Tigrayan Peoples' Liberation Army fighters might forcefully recruit them to join the fight against the Ethiopian army. They have harshly threatened and killed youths in areas they had occupied if they would not join their forces.

Right now, we are putting together a plan to set up a short term equivalent of a child sponsorship scheme, with the aim of securing funding for the 'G50' on a regular

basis. We have no idea how long this will be needed for, hopefully only a few months, but right now there is no sign of a peace deal of any sort, and so the suffering continues. Amlaku agonises over the refugees he sees on the street, but realises that he can only help so many, and so just has to turn down others who approach him or phone him. He was recently in the regional capital of Amhara, Bahir Dar, to
