

Gravel and Tar 2023 to be Held in Ashhurst

Gravel and Tar locked in for the Manawatu region 2023 again—and Ashhurst is front and centre!

The Manawatu region is well known for hosting enduring sporting events and the Gravel and Tar event continues this tradition. The Greasy Chain Charitable Trust, who manage the event, today announced "Now in its seventh year, the New Zealand Cycling Event of the Year" is back again for 2023.

However, for 2023 instead of the usual start in Feilding and finish in Palmerston North, the event will start and finish in Ashhurst. Bob Selden, Chair of the Greasy Chain Charitable Trust commented, "This is a great initiative to take this international cycling event out into the Manawatu region towns and villages, and as an Ashhurst resident, I'm particularly excited as it will not only give locals the easy opportunity of watching riders in many international teams compete for the Gravel and Tar trophy but will also provide a boost to the local business community." Selden added, "Many of the international teams will be billeted in Feilding for the week prior, and will no doubt visit Ashhurst a number of times to check out the route, so I know Ashhurst residents and businesses will make



them feel welcome."

The Gravel and Tar is an international cycling event, sanctioned by the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI) where riders and teams not only compete for podium places, but also for UCI points that accumulate to provide them entry to the major international events, such as the Tour de France and many others.

Inaddition to the competition for UCI points, cyclists vie for the challenge of competing in the Gravel and Tar as it has developed quite a reputation. Where international road cycle racing is traditionally held on sealed roads, the Gravel and Tar, is one of the first professional events to combine sealed and gravel roads in its parcours. The Gravel and Tar even has a Wikipedia page that states, "the race is primarily on sealed roads, however the highlight is the multiple gravel sectors (usually five or six) throughout the course. The race is now considered to be the toughest one-day elite race in the Oceania region. The race is held in January each year, making it one of the first races on the UCI Calendar, and a key chance for teams and riders to gain early UCI points. The event has seen teams enter from countries such as Sweden, Japan, the US, and Australia, along with the best New Zealand men's teams."

Starting in Ashhurst on Saturday morning, 21st January 2023 and covering approximately 140kms, the event will progress along Pohangina Road, then start a circuit including Pohangina Valley Road East. Gravel sections include Churchill Road, Finnis Road, Midland Road and Spur Road. Route outline is contained in the adjacent map.

Annual Ashhurst Food Drive

Despite the Food Drive being cancelled in Palmerston North, the local Lions Club are still organising one for Ashhurst, on Saturday, 26th November. Our small Food Bank relies on the Food Drive for its main stock of supplies, which currently last for nine-ten months. This year our loyal supporters from the Pop-Up Wardrobe were joined by local businesses in the form of the Ladies' Night Out, to raise even more for the Food Bank. Calendar sales, organised by Ric Foxley, have also been an amazing boost and we continue to be extremely grateful for the support of the Anglican and River churches, and generous members of the community who drop off supplies from time to time.

This year our focus has been on providing delicious, nutritious food for our families, using some of the ingredients that spend more time on the shelves than others. As a result, chickpeas and lentils are more popular than they were and we are seeing less reliance on instant noodles. Having financial resources for the first time has meant that we can now provide fresh bread, milk and meat, among

other things. This helps to provide most of the ingredients when putting meal packages together and pass on the benefits of bulk bargains to our customers. We are also able to expand the range of tinned vegetables and fruit on offer, as well as supplementing dwindling supplies.

Looking ahead to the Food Drive, if you would like ideas for what to include in your package, the following is the Food Bank shopping list I use:

Baking—flour, dried fruit, sugar. Biscuits. Cereals—cornflakes, rice bubbles, rolled oats, Weetbix.

Cleaners—all-purpose spray cleaner, dishwash liquid, cream cleaner, toilet cleaner, washing powder.

Dried peas and dried soups.

Desserts—custard powder, jellies, tins of fruit.

Drinks—coffee, tea, chocolate drink.

Pasta—dried spaghetti, spirals, penne, shapes.

Rice—white long and short grain, brown. Snacks for school lunches—multipacks of chippies, snack bars.

the estimated need for 5000 new homes in Palmerston North in the next ten years. The possibilities of fitting more houses into existing areas will limit the need for costly new infrastructure in greenfield sites. The proposal for houses include a mix of building styles up to three storeys and includes townhouses, apartments, duplexes or standard detached houses. It is proposed that section sizes could be reduced from the current city limit of 350 sq/m to as low as 150 sq/m. These zones would need to cluster around existing shops, schools and parks with suggestions of Kelvin Grove, Awapuni, Highbury and Milson. Consultation on this plan change will be a 3-step process with step 2 due in late 2022 and the final formal step in early 2023.

Life in Ashhurst is returning to the new post-Covid normal. We keep an eye on progress of the road construction on the hills above us as the landscape changes shape, bridge piers rise in a tangle of steel

and concrete, and foundation work for the western roundabout takes shape. There are multiple sites of earthworks beginning to ramp up as the drier seasons emerge. They are well past the halfway point of moving 6.5 million cubic metres of material for cuts and fill to create the steady contour needed for the highway.

The local pub has been resurrected with the Ashhurst Inn reborn as the Rusty Radiator Inn. Still early days, but drinks, pool, music and pub grub have returned on limited opening hours and days.

Summer and the holiday break is lurking around the corner as Christmas heads our way. The Ashhurst Pohangina Lions Club will be hoping the difficulties of the past few years have subsided and their popular smallholder's auction will return to Raumai in late January. Still time to clear out the shed and add to their sale items, while making space for new additions.

Te Ahu a Turanga: Manawatū Tararua Highway Update

The long weekend saw the end of a successful landscaping season on Te Ahu a Turanga: Manawatu Tararua Highway. Our three landscaping teams have done well this year, planting a total of 485,000 plants across various sites throughout the rohe surrounding the project. It's been a tough winter, with almost constant wet weather, but they've braved the elements and have worked hard to achieve this impressive figure. Most of the planting this year has been stream riparian planting, with a mix of native trees, grasses and shrubs. There has also been some wetland buffer planting. To make sure these new native plants get the best start in life, our teams will continue follow-up maintenance over the summer months to make sure they're growing well. We're already preparing for the next planting season to start in May 2023 by confirming what plants we need for next year-and how many-to give our suppliers enough time to propagate the massive quantities of plants required.

Construction teams are also making good

progress on some of the major structures on the highway. The final pile (of 16) on the Ecoviaduct bridge near the western end of the project will be drilled this month, and one column has been completed. The Parahaki Bridge over the Manawatu River is also progressing well, with the second pier now rising out of the coffer dam in the middle of the river.

This month we started geotechnical investigation around the Ashhurst Bridge for a shared user path, which will connect near the Ashhurst Domain to the Western roundabout. We'll be drilling seven bore holes in the ground at the Ashhurst end of the bridge. This shared user path will allow pedestrians and cyclists to travel the length of the highway from Ashhurst to Woodville.

The results of these ground investigations will determine which structure option we develop to design.

Speaking of the Ashhurst Bridge, travellers who've crossed it recently may have noticed an abandoned car - which had been left on the riverbed several weeks ago - has been

Book Review—Sons of a Good Keen Man—The Crump Brothers

Kiwi icon, symbol of New Zealand manhood, funny, talented, unknowable, charming, cruel—Barry Crump was all of these things and more.

This newly published memoir was written by his six sons, all of whom admit they are no closer to solving the mystery of who their father really was. Martin Crump writes the foreword and points out that there have been many books written about his father but what sets this one apart is the fact that it has been written by Barry's own sons-Ivan, Martin, Stephen, Harry, Erik and Lyall. Barry was married five times and each son has a different story to tell about him and his life with their respective mothers (often very short-lived) Martin remarks that the brothers knew Barry in very different ways, depending on where and when they were at the time. Indeed, in some cases they were unaware of each others' existence. There are, however, common threads running through all the brothers' stories of their father—uncertainty, insecurity and longing to see more of their father. Some of them very angry and resentful of his disinterest.

A lot of questions on his strange ideas

of fatherhood are answered when it is discovered that Barry's own childhood was blighted by a cruel and abusive father. We learn there may have been a life-long fear of becoming like his own father and this fact could explain some of the rejection of his own sons.

The events unfolding in the book mostly took place in times past when it was not all uncommon for young men to "shoot through" when an unwanted pregnancy came to light, so some context in time is essential when reading of the various relationships and children in Barry's life.

His stories and books are very well known and there is no doubt of his talent as a writer, pub raconteur, hunter and all around good keen man. His laid-back humour and TV appearances in the 70's and 80's were enjoyed at the time. Who can forget "Crumpie and Scottie" Toyota ads.

In many ways, the Crump we knew and liked, was just a character, resembling the real man in superficial ways, but an imaginary figure—a myth. We think we know a public figure but it is often an illusion (like one of his fictional characters in his own books)."


110.5 mm of rain fell in September, above the August average of 95.1 mm.
