Free Bus Travel for COVID Vaccinations

In conjunction with Waka Kotahi New Zealand Transport Agency, passengers on Horizons Regional Council bus services can travel to and from their COVID-19 vaccination appointments for free until 31st December 2021.

Horizons Public Transport Committee Chair Sam Ferguson says it's important for Council to do their part in reducing barriers to anyone getting vaccinated.

"If someone is using the bus to get to or from their vaccination they just need to show the bus driver their appointment information which they would have received via text message, email, letter or vaccine card," says Cr Ferguson.

If the individual getting vaccinated requires a care giver or has dependents

Waka Kotahi New Zealand Transport Agency Update continued

The current workforce of around 200 people is expected to increase to up to 350 over season two, which runs from October 2021 to April 2022. If you're interested in getting work on Te Ahu a Turanga, check out our jobs page *nzta*. *govt.nz/projects/te-ahu-a-turanga/jobs*. Opportunities for local businesses to tender for work packs are also advertised on this page.

Jobs are one side of the coin; training is the other. The project has a commitment to work with our communities to provide training that gives local people opportunities to gain skills that can lead to work on this project, and beyond.

Te Ahu a Turanga is collaborating with community organisations, such as Tararua REAP, to build local capability and skills in the community. We are also partnering with the Ministry of Social Development on a series of Conservation Work Skills New Zealand training courses, and our partnership with UCOL gives students studying Infrastructure Level 2 practical experience on Te Ahu a Turanga.

A six-week Infrastructure Skills Centre course is also taking enrolments. This is an industry-wide training initiative created and facilitated by Fulton Hogan, one of our partners on the Alliance. This course connects employers with potential employees, who are in paid employment from their first day. It starts on 1st November and will be based at the National Driver Training Centre/Manfeild in Feilding. This course is being provided in partnership with the Ministry of Social Development, Civil Contractors New Zealand and the Construction Sector Accord.

Book Review: The Happiest Man on Earth by Eddie Jaku

Eddie Jaku was born Abraham Jakubowiez in Germany in 1920. He celebrated his 100th birthday in 2020, a survivor of some of the worst atrocities of World War II Auschwitz concentration camps.

This autobiography will sadden, astonish and shock you, but ultimately leave you in awe of the human spirit and its ability to rise above darkness. To quote his opening prologue—

"My dear friend. I have lived for a century and I know what it is to stare evil in the face. I have seen the very worst in mankind, the horrors of the death camps, the Nazi efforts to exterminate my life and the lives of my people.

But I now consider myself the happiest man on Earth".

The first 19 years of Eddie's life in Eastern Germany were happy. His Jewish family were a loving middle-class family who believed in helping those less fortunate. All this changed, of course, in 1933 when Hitler came to power along with the wave of anti-semitism. Eddie left home at 13 after enrolling at an engineering college, where he studied for five years under a false name.

When he returned to his parents' home after graduation, it was to an empty house and no family. He was never to see them again. His memories of his own imprisonment are harrowing but he was more worried about the fate of his parents and siblings.

It is hard to understand how anyone could survive what he and others did and not be bitter and twisted. He is anything but, his last sentence in the book is—

"Please, every day, remember to be happy and to make yourself a friend to the world. Do this for your friend, Eddie".

A marvellous story and one you will never forget.

Native Bee Awareness

September saw the beginning of Spring and Bee Awareness Month. The focus is on the honey bee (Apis mellifera) and our reliance on bees for much of our food.

We were encouraged to put water out for bees to drink, and also plant our gardens to feed the bees and they would, in return, pollinate our plants, including those that produce our food.

However, there are other bees to consider.

New Zealand has 28 native species, 27 of these are endemic to New Zealandthat means they are found nowhere else in the world. New Zealand native bees are solitary and tend to be black or grey. Some could easily be mistaken for flies or wasps. They tend to stay close to their food sources and live in small tunnels in either trees or in the ground.

They do face competition for food from the domestic honey bee, and things like Bee Awareness Month (while good) can very easily attract attention away from our native bees. When planting we are advised to plant for honey bees and the introduced flowering species they prefer.

The biggest threat to our native bees, you guessed it, is humans. Industrialisation has led to the loss of most of our native forests. The use of herbicides and pesticides are readily used to get rid of pests and weeds.

There is still a lot of research to be done on our native bees (according to what I have read), and establishing any in the community is not necessarily easy if they are not here. However we can make changes to encourage them, and that can benefit our other natives like tui who also pollinate our native plants.

- Plant natives in your garden
- Leave some bare soil to encourage nesting
- Avoid or minimise the use of herbicides and pesticides. Look for natural ways to manage weeds and pests.
- If you can, choose organic foods and eat seasonally.
