Community Comment

Our Autumn beckons with cooler nights, shorter days and leaves beginning to fall. Our farming friends will be hoping for some rain to replenish the soil and alleviate the dry period of past months. In town, we need to be wary of blocked spouting and drains, which need to be cleared of debris to work efficiently.

It is the season to sow grass seed and restore lawns. Some undergrounding of the electrical cabling on the edge of the Village Green is under landscaping restoration at present. The verge further up Cambridge Avenue is also under repair following the installation of power and a cell phone tower at its corner with Wyndham Street. Improved mobile phone coverage and 5G network capability is likely, but comes at the cost of an increased density of cell towers closer to each other.

The City Council is obliged to grant consent for this equipment under a telecommunication standard (NESTF, 2016) set by government. No notified consent processes are required, so landowners around the site were blindsided when it appeared on their skyline. Facebook's Ashhurst Chat has been active on the matter. At least the mast doubles as a host for a street light.

Work to create a turning bay at the end of Custom Street is ongoing. The large stormwater pipes are in place, but the

area is yet to be raised to the levels required, the street sealed and kerbs installed. Local neighbours are sceptical that the work will be completed by Easter after the previous estimate of Christmas has long passed by.

Consultation on the future of water management options have closed, but submissions on the Draft Annual Budget are now open for access. A big chunk of money, which had been expected in the Long-Term Plan, has been withdrawn from NZTA so budgets for roading and footpaths have been reduced considerably in some areas this year.

Ashhurst features in the Plan with funding set aside for water quality improvements, work at the Domain, and supporting Splashhurst. The Central Energy Trust Arena has some big budget items totalling over \$10 million, for a big screen and a new multi-use facility, along with other upgrades and improvements.

A civic marae and cultural centre at Te Mohu o Poutoa-ANZAC Park attracts funding of over \$10 million for the project and improved road access. The facility will include a public café, a civic marae, spaces for private events, along with a view over the river and the city.

Submission documents can be found in the library, or via the PNCC website, under its menu of 'Participate Palmy'.

Closing date is Thursday, 17th April.

Hello all, welcome to the April edition.

Last month I mentioned the Annual New Zealand Fish of the Year Awards. Did you vote? The winner has been announced.

The fish that won first place was the Blobfish. The Orange Roughy came second and the Longfin Eel/Tuna came third. The top ten were rounded out by the Whale Shark, Big-bellied Seahorse, Great White Shark, Lamprey, Spinetailed Devil Ray, Basking Shark, and Blue Cod. Nine of these fish are considered vulnerable by conservation groups, including the Blobfish.

5,583 New Zealanders voted in Fish of the Year 2025, up from 1,021 in 2024. It is good to see an interest in our native fauna, as they tend to be hidden from our general sight and day to day life but they are interesting when you get to read about them. Designed for families and ideal for children aged three to nine years, Aya's story encourages compassion and empathy for different cultures, and helps us all become part of an important movement of change towards living together in peace, and all the while featuring plenty of magical puppet moments, music and songs, and lots of joining in! Ava and the Butterfly is based on a children's book by Ōtautahi/ Christchurch author Dr Maysoon Salama, who wrote the story for her granddaughter Aya, after Aya lost her

Ashhurst and Pohangina will come together on April 25th to remember those who served and sacrificed for our nation, marking ANZAC Day with a series of commemorative services.

ANZAC Day holds a significant place in the hearts of New Zealanders, commemorating the landing of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps at Gallipoli, Turkey, on April 25, 1915. While the Gallipoli campaign was ultimately unsuccessful, the courage and camaraderie displayed by the ANZACs have become enduring symbols of national identity. Over time, ANZAC Day has evolved to honour all New Zealanders who have served in conflicts past and present.

This year's commemorations will include:

I'd also like to remind you about Home Fire Safety Visits (HFSV). Last year the Ashhurst Brigade did the most Home Fire Safety Visits for a volunteer brigade in our region (which covers Wellington, Manawatū/Whanganui, Hawkes Bay and Taranaki). This outstanding achievement shows how dedicated we are to preventing fires in your home before

they start and I thank everyone who has allowed us to visit your home and family.

A Home Fire Safety Visit involves us visiting your home to check and install smoke alarms, discussing escape plans and giving fire safety advice. We will also answer any questions you have. If you're interested in a Home Fire Safety Visit please go to *fireandemergency.nz* to sign up for one and you'll hear from me.

Remember to check your smoke alarms too! A house fire can become unsurvivable in two minutes so early warning gives your family the best chance of escape.





We offer open pollinated seeds collected from people's gardens, hybrid and commercially produced seeds. Open pollinated has a green label, the others have white.

Open pollinated means you can go on to collect more seed from these plants. These seeds are acclimated to the growing conditions in this area, so they are extra special (you can not collect seeds from plants grown from hybrid stock).

We provide as much information as possible. However, we recommend a simple germination test if you are uncertain about their viability: place some seeds between a moist paper towel, put in a ziplock bag and leave somewhere warm for up to two weeks. This should give an indication of how many seeds will germinate.

We are always looking for donated seeds-especially those grown in our area. They can be left at the Seed Library station, in the Ashhurst Library. When donating, we'd love to know what they are and when and where they were harvested.

Amlaku's Ethiopean Update

It's been while since I shared an update on Amlaku in Ethiopia. Our journey over the past few years has given us a rare insight into what it is like

Amlaku's Ethiopean Update

disrupted, many thousands of people have been killed, and there are currently 4.3 million internally displaced people (IDPs, or refugees in their own country) in Ethiopia, people like Amlaku and his family, who are stuck in Addis with no way of going home to pick up their life there.

The first civil war ended in November 2022, with a peace deal signed in Pretoria. During that war, Amhari (the region that Amlaku comes from) militia forces fought with the Federal Government forces against the Tigrayan rebels from the north. In August 2023, Prime Minister Abey decided to disarm the Amhari militias, known as FANO, who, unsurprisingly, weren't keen on the idea, and so started the second civil war. Both wars have raged back and forth through Lalibela, the town closest to our village, with significant damage done to the town, to our village of Baregota, to infrastructure, and to the lives of thousands of people. Today Federal forces control the towns and cities while

FANO controls the countryside. They seem to have reached some sort of exhausted stalemate.

In Addis Ababa, the capital, life is extremely difficult, especially if you are Amhari by tribal affiliation. Both Amlaku and the two boys we are caring for have experienced this. The



police there are definitely not your friends. Raids on Amhari homes are frequent, with the boys having a fairly new I-Pad smashed onto the floor a few weeks back. No compensation. Groups of Amhari young men gathering on the street are likely to be attacked and detained by the police. Unless they can show the proper papers, they can be imprisoned and even sent to the front line of the fighting as 'cannon fodder'.

Amlaku is now married to Bezawit and they have two little girls, Penny who is almost two, and a new baby they have called Amen! That pregnancy was not altogether welcomed, but 'what can you do?', so 'so be it', let's make the best of it. The word 'Amen' at the end of a prayer means exactly that—so be it! Hence the name. Love it! They live in a very small flat in Addis. Because he is Amhari, he cannot get a job in Addis, so they are totally dependent on us for the funds to enable them to live. They are also trying to provide funds to family back in the village, 15 people in all, who, while they

had a reasonably good harvest thanks to funding from Anglican Missions here, don't have money for cooking oil, spices, and other essential cooking items.

cover only a small percentage of them in a brief article. In this third and final article about moths, I will discuss a few more of our native species.

In the two previous articles I wrote

New Zealand has many moth species, numbering well over 100, that belong to the Grass Moth Family. Most are an inconspicuous greyish-brown colour but one that I have photographed a number of times is called the Little Orange-spot Scoparia (see photo). The caterpillar larvae of this and most of the other species in this family are thought to feed on mosses.



A rather distinctive, though rather small, native moth is the Titoki Moth (see photo). It occurs throughout the country on it's host plant, Titoki. When at rest, the moth's black wings are folded



tightly along the body, contrasting with the white head, thorax and legs. The long antennae are held against the body while the white labial palps curve around in front of the head.



One of our quite special and diverse groups of moths are the Lichen Tuft Moths, of which there are about 40 beautifully species. Most are camouflaged when resting on the lichencovered trunks of forest trees, in part due to their colour but also due to the tufts of raised, black or brown scales on their wings which imitate the irregular surface of lichens. One of these is the Green Lichen Tuft Moth (see photo).



Another group of endemic moths, belonging to the Concealer Moth Family, are the Litter Moths, so-called because the larvae feed on leaf litter. Once again there are many species within this group, including some that have yet to be formerly described. An example of these moths is the Yellow Litter Moth (see photo). Other species of Litter Moth share the same shape but have different colouration.

Ashhurst Rainfall

14 mm of rain fell in February 2025, 14 below the monthly long-term average of from 73.26 mm.

Rain was recorded on 4 days, with the highest one-day rainfall of 7 mm on the 26th of February.

The total annual rainfall for the period from 1st of January to the 31st February is now 105.5 mm, which is below the long-term average for this period of 147.32 mm.
