## Mahi for Artwork on Tararua Side of Highway

The September issue of the Village Voice described the meaning of the artworks on the western side of Te Ahu a Turanga highway. Content from NZTA, and media coverage from Stuff and RNZ have been combined below to describe the two sculptures in place on the eastern side of this key connecting highway between the Manawatū and Tararua.

The two mahi toi artworks in the eastern part of the project were designed by artist Sandy Adsett (Ngāti Pahauwera, Ngāti Kahungunu).

This sculpture at the Woodville lookout is named Manungāro (Birds of Extinction). It acknowledges the sadness experienced by the tragic loss of native ngā manu (birds) which is illustrated through the story of Uenuku. In this interpretation of the story, Uenuku fell in love with the beautiful mist maiden Hinepukohurangi. He attempts to keep





Hinepukohurangi with him on Earth, but she is destined to return to the heavens. Heartbroken, Uenuku wanders the Earth until Ranginui (the Sky Father) takes pity on him and transforms him into a rainbow. Just as a rainbow has no end, Uenuku is forever searching for a love he can never attain.

In this sculpture, the endless yearning of Uenuku is related to the loss of three extinct ngā manu species, the hokioi (Haast's eagle), the moa and the huia, which are shown travelling up Uenuku symbolising their loss and the endless yearning it created. This serves as a reminder to those living today, and in future generations, to respect and preserve what is here and to not allow any more precious taonga to be lost forever.

Adsett has named the 12-metrehigh steel sculpture on the Woodville

The red, blue and yellow colours also represented a balance between Ngāti Kahungunu Rangitāne.

Engineering limitations and weight bearing capabilities of the soil limited some designs and choices of locations

construction engineers had collaborate during the design phases to create structures which were practical to construct and long lasting.

These artworks are a refreshing addition to the brutal architecture of the past and follow international trends of adding some humanity to construction projects.

## Letter to the Editor

The Ashhurst School Board of Trustees would like to respond to a letter published in the October issue of the Village Voice.

Ashhurst School is a proud part of the Ashhurst community, providing a safe and vibrant space for the children of Ashhurst, up-holding the key values of Tū Tangata, Whai Ngākau and Manawaroa.

The pump track at Ashhurst School was a welcome addition to the school premises and initially was opened for use both by the school and the public on 12th April, 2018. The construction of the pump track was solely a school funded project, utilising school funds for its construction and materials required.

There have been questions raised as to the funding of the project. Further construction of the concrete track encircling the school field was later completed with assistance from a number of streams. These included from various successful funding community grant applications, fundraising through the PTA, use of board funds and a portion of funding from Palmerston North City Council. Only 14% of the cost of the track was contributed by Palmerston North City Council. The remaining funds were tagged for the container and bikes for the children to ride. The Bikes in Schools programme is separate in both design and funding to the

construction of the pump track.

The Bikes in Schools project was opened to the school and community in February 2019. From the very outset, the intention was always for the public to use both of these key additions to the school grounds and for 5 years this is exactly what was available. In 2019, a Memorandum of Understanding was in place to help quide the management of access to the school grounds; however, this agreement has since been terminated.

Sadly though, between 2020 and 2023 the school experienced a significant escalation in activities happening on school grounds that undermined the safety of Ashhurst School students and staff.

On multiple occasions the school malicious experienced damage, instances of significant theft, regular occurrences of shattered glass on playgrounds and fields students at risk and concerns voiced from school staff feeling unsafe when leaving the grounds in the evening/ weekends. The damages caused to the school are in the tens of thousands of dollars, that has to be redirected away from continuing to upgrade existina facilities and potential personnel increases in the school. These factors all contributed to the decision in place today. With the closure of the school gates, safety

concerns and damage to property has significantly decreased.

## **Ashhurst Volunteer Fire Brigade**

Kia Ora Ashhurst and Pohangina,

Lately our training has been on hazardous substances spills and exposures. This focused on how to identify hazsubs and methods of containment and decontamination. This all culminated in a training scenario where a member of the public had been exposed to a toxic substance. Upon arrival at a council facility we were faced with a casualty and a spill of an unknown liquid.

Myself and another Firefighter were tasked with conducting a "snap rescue" of the casualty and then identifying and containing the spill. At the same time the rest of the brigade were setting up cordons and an

emergency decontamination process. This basically involves spraying lots and lots of water at whatever you want decontaminated! Once the casualty was cleaned and seen to by our first aiders to treat chemical burns, it was our turn for decon. To add realism my partner and I stripped off to our knickers to be blasted by cold water!

The scenario was a great way to cap off our hazsubs training and gave us some points to work on. I also apologise to my fellow Firefighters who no doubt had to call peer support after being subjected to a traumatic event witnessing me mostly naked!

## **Community Comment**

The city council has wasted little time in their effort to upgrade the footpath and street services in Wyndham Street. The residents' petition regarding the state of the road and the council's resulting migration of funding has promoted an early start for this work. Construction of the north side footpath is already underway. The total project is expected to be completed mid-year 2026.

Other footpath repairs are also

underway elsewhere in Ashhurst, as part of the city's planned maintenance programme. Broken and uneven sections of footpath are properly excavated, filled and compacted before the new layer of concrete is laid.

Community information sessions have recently been held to discuss options for heavy traffic and freight routes around the city. This business case project will identify a preferred route for a proposed regional freight

## In the Garden

As we come into December we are officially into summer, the beginning of the dryest part of the gardening year, and the beginning of summer harvesting.

In my garden I have started to pick raspberries, strawberries and red currants from established plants. Berries are a wonderful option for smaller gardens, and being perennials are a good investment, especially considering the price they are in the shops for these delicious treats. Raspberries are a particularly good option as they will put up runners so one plant will produce several more, increasing your crop.

I also have lots of elderflowers on my elderberry trees (do not plant them if you do not want them forever). They can be eaten, but I prefer to leave them and harvest the berries—which are poisonous if eaten raw. They should be cooked before consumption. However, to ensure I get some, I will be bagging them once the fruit starts growing as the birds

## **Ashhurst Rainfall**


Hi. I'm Phil Pirie, the new provider of the rainfall records. We have lived in Hiwinui next to Hiwinui School for 30 years and I have been recording the rainfall for over 20 years. The rain gauge is five kilometres in a straight line from the centre of Ashhurst and on the top of the ridge so the readings will be different to the previous location. Also the rainfall can vary greatly within Hiwinui due to the wind. Our average rainfall is 960mm per year and for this year we will be well below this as I don't expect there to be 300mm of rain in the next two months. Looking forward to continuing to provide the rainfall records to the Ashhurst, Pohangina and Hiwinui communities

88 mm of rain fell in October 2025, below the monthly long-term average of 124.4 mm. Rain was recorded on 24 days, with the highest one-day rainfall of 13 mm on the 13th of October.

The total annual rainfall for the period from 1st of January to the 31st October is now 853.2 mm, which is below the long-term average for this period of 935.6 mm. The total rainfall for this period according to Phil's records is 660mm.

Turning to more council based matters, we also heard from many of you during our community sessions of the recent Ring Road planning. This project will play a big role in the city's future transport network, and your community, and feedback is essential as we build the business case and refine the preferred route. The project team is now working through everything that was shared, and we'll look to provide another update in early 2026.

On the ground, work on Wyndham Street continues to move along well. Higgins will take a short pause over Christmas and New Year, with crews returning in January. Residents in the construction area will continue to receive updates as the project progresses.

With the Manawatu-Tararua, Te Ahu a Turanga Highway now open, NZTA has provided some funding connected to the handover of roads used as detours during construction. We're now finalising the details and timings of when we will be able to get this work completed. We'll make sure any roads affected will receive a letter drop ahead of works, and let everyone else know through our website and Infrastructure Update which is on Facebook each Friday.

At the Ashhurst Water Treatment

Plant, the new filtration system is performing well. Before we introduce this water to homes and businesses, we'll be flushing pipes across the network to move any remaining minerals. We'll share timings with you via letter once these are confirmed.

A reminder that, as with last year, there will be no free kerbside Christmas tree collection. You can still drop real trees at the Awapuni Resource Recovery Centre free of charge from Boxing Day through to the end of January.

A big well done to the children taking part in the Ashhurst Summer Reading Programme—enjoy your books over the holidays. The Ashhurst Library team put in a huge effort each year to support young readers, and it's great to see such strong participation. Speaking of summer reading, the latest Palmy Proud magazine is now out for you to read. This edition includes a feature on a couple of well-loved Ashhurst locations—including the Domain as one of the city's best easy walks. Grab a copy, and if the weather cooperates, you might even enjoy it at the new parklet outside Village Coffee & Co. The parklet is part of Council's placemaking programme to encourage people to sit outside and catch up. It's now the tenth in the wider city area.
