Domain Dog Poo Bag Dispenser Tube.

For the past 5-6 years, on a voluntary basis, I have kept the poo bag dispenser attached to the corner of the changing rooms stocked up. This has worked well with the Council supplying me with boxes of bags, and I then fill up the tube (capacity 20 rolls) as needed.

Unfortunately, over the past few weeks people or persons unknown have:

(a) been taking bags and scattering them across the fields, and

(b) emptying out the tube of all the bags—sometimes as many as 20

rolls in a day. A tube full normally lasts for about 5 days.

Access to the top of the tube is difficult, with the walkway to the lookout on the changing rooms now blocked off.

Taking all of this into consideration, I have advised the Council Dog Control people that I will retire from this role at the end of January. They are working on an alternative arrangement, but it could take a week or two to kick in.

Community Comment

The welcome summer holidays have provided plenty of heat and sunshine in past weeks with time for rest and relaxation. A return to work or to school brings us back to reality as another cycle of our lives begins.

The hot dry period has not yet triggered any water restrictions in the city of Ashhurst. Sensible water use is encouraged. Adding a garden mulch and watering in cooler periods, to limit evaporation, is helpful in conserving water use. Please remember to water young street trees if they are wilting.

The risk of wild fires has increased and most outdoor fires now need a permit. Check out the web site of 'checkitsalright.nz' for the latest current information and associated access to the application process.

The City Council has some consultation processes underway which may affect Ashhurst residents. The bylaws for 'Animals and Bees' and 'Dog Control' are currently under review with consultation closing 12 February. The Management Plan for the Ashhurst Domain is also under review with a number of options for regular users and the wider community to provide comment. The local

community can help guide how the reserve should be used, developed and maintained. A community open day will be held at the Ashhurst Domain on Saturday, 10th February from 10.00am-2.00pm to gather views. New Zealand Transport Agency— Waka Kotahi will also be present to share plans for the shared use pathway linking the Domain to the Western Gateway and the new Te Ahu a Turanga highway. This phase of information gathering closes 29th February, with a formal consultation process proposed to begin in April. Check out the Library, or search for 'Participate Palmy' for more details and timelines.

Crisis events in past years of pandemics, floods and wildfires are a reminder to plan for emergencies and family-resilience. Disruption of global supply lines have affected goods delivery to and from New Zealand in past years, and we now have operational threats to Suez and Panama Canals for differing reasons. Book Review: The Crewe Murders

The Crewe Murders: Inside New Zealand's Most Infamous Cold Case by Kirsty Johnston and James Hollings

This brand new publication by Massey University Press will be of great interest to many. It is not about solving one of our most well-known murder mysteries, but more about the people involved and the importance of a fair and just legal system.

Written by award-winning journalist Kirsty Johnston and James Hollings, Associate Professor of Journalism at Massey University, this is a carefullycrafted and detailed investigation of the double murders of Jeanette and Harvey Crewe on 17th June 1970.

Much of the background to the case is well-known—farmers from Pukekawa, theories on who would have motive for such a horrific crime, family feuds in

the district, town gossip etc. What sets this book apart from others written over the years is the clear and concise presentation of proven facts. Facts that have been sought out and confirmed or discarded in the process of the authors' investigation into the crime committed.

There are many scientific details cartridge cases, models, wire, bullets and axles and also interesting personal details of the lives of families involved. But never anything salacious or intentionally biased written by the authors; no personal opinions are ever allowed to become apparent or obvious.

book is the importance of evaluating. all the evidence first before developing a suspect. Another point well made was the large part the media played in bringing to light new evidence and questions that needed an answer. It also gave a voice to people who would not have otherwise been heard.

particularly book was interesting for me personally, as we as a family were personal friends of the Thomas family, who at the time lived nearby in Matakana. We knew how devastating the whole case was for the wider Thomas family, they fought so hard and long for Arthur's freedom and never wavered from their belief in his innocence. The movie "Beyond Reasonable Doubt" based on David Yallop's book emphasised commitment the family had to see justice done. This is a well-balanced and meticulously researched account of an event in our history which still continues to be divisive to this day.

Geological History of the Ashhurst District

When I arrived at Massey University from Australia in 1973, as a lecturer in geomorphology (scientific study of landforms) it took me several years to adjust to the rapid pace of geological change in New Zealand. Many parts of the Australian physical landscape have barely changed in tens or even hundreds of millions of years owing to its mainly drier climate, hard ancient rocks and tectonic stability. The Manawatu is different in nearly every respect: the wetter climate enables the soft young rocks to be rapidly eroded by rivers and streams, accompanied by landsliding, while even the older hard rocks of the local ranges are relatively easily eroded owing to their fractured nature. But the greatest difference is caused by New Zealand's active tectonic environment. Situated in a location where the Pacific

Plate is plunging beneath the Indo-Australian Plate, the Manawatu rocks are being faulted, folded and uplifted above sea level to produce the landscape we see today.

The oldest rocks exist beneath our entire region but are only exposed at the surface where the ranges are being uplifted between major fault lines. Those rocks originally formed during late Mesozoic time (200-250 million years ago) when mainly sandy marine sediment was compacted to form greywacke rock. It contains very few fossils but where the Pohangina Valley enters the Ruahine Range I discovered a football-sized limestone boulder embedded within greywacke. It contained a great variety of marine fossils and microfossils that experts considered to be about 220

million years old, including one fossil species never previously seen in New Zealand.

These ancient rocks were uplifted above sea-level, forming a land mass that was worn down before again becoming submerged about 3 million years ago and covered in younger more easily eroded fossiliferous muddy, silty, sandy, shelly and pebbly sediments. The present landscape began to be shaped when tectonic activity increased about 2 million years ago. The ranges to the north and south of the Manawatu Gorge were uplifted above sea level but remained submerged in the vicinity of the Gorge until less than half a million years ago. Land to the east of the ranges had risen above sea level before that time and the incipient Manawatu River system flowed westward. When the lowest part of the ranges finally emerged above sea level the river was large enough to erode its bed downwards and maintain its westward course across the slowly rising greywacke rocks, thereby forming the Gorge. The softer cover beds have been eroded off most of the older, higher parts of the Ruahine and Tararua ranges but, in the vicinity of the Gorge, still cover the greywacke rocks and can be observed in Saddle Road cuttings.

Although the ranges have risen to the highest elevation, other parts of the Manawatu were also uplifted at varying rates. Parallel to the main ranges, elongate wedges of greywacke rock are being thrust upwards at depth along fault lines but these are mantled by thick Cenozoic cover beds to form smooth folds known as anticlines (see diagram). Closest to Ashhurst is the Pohangina Anticline that forms the boundary between the Pohangina and Oroua Rivers. The youngest southern part of the anticline slopes gently away from its crest and is crossed by the

Ashhurst-Bunnythorpe Road at its highest point near Hiwinui. The Pohangina Anticline is a textbook example of a growing anticline and was described in a popular United States geomorphology textbook. In future geological time the anticlines may develop into new mountain ranges.

Only 125,000 years ago the Tasman Sea coastline extended along the western margin of the ranges as far north as the Gorge. A coastal plain built out from the ranges and now forms the highest terrace south of Ashhurst, The Aokautere suburb has been built upon this marine terrace. With the onset of the last Ice Age, sea levels dropped, causing the shoreline to retreat well to the west of the present one. Uplift continued but the main changes to our local landscape are related to the effect of regular climatic fluctuations on behaviour. There is no evidence that the Ruahine Range or northern Tararua Range were glaciated, but during the colder phases of the last Ice Age the tree-line elevation dropped by up to 1000 m. With more exposed rock and active frost weathering the amount of being supplied to gravel headwaters of our local rivers increased dramatically. The rivers could not transport all the gravel downstream but deposited much of it, building up their beds to produce wider floodplains with channels.

During warmer climatic periods within the last Ice Age, vegetation once again stabilized the slopes of the ranges and, with a diminishing gravel supply the rivers were again able to erode downwards in response to continuing uplift, leaving their gravelly floodplains stranded as a series of terraces above the river level. The oldest river terraces are the highest, having been uplifted for a longer Continued on next page

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

period of time. They can only be seen to the north of Ashhurst-Pohangina, such as at Table Flat near Apiti.

The gravels of the older, higher terraces in our own district, such as those overlooking Ashhurst along Colyton Road., or at the top of Wyndham Street, are overlain by a metre or more of silt (loess) blown from the wide riverbeds during subsequent cold phase(s). The silt also contains a bed of volcanic ash that was deposited during a major

Taupo eruption about 26,000 years ago.

Ashhurst lies upon the former wide floodplain that developed during the most recent cold phase and was abandoned by the river about 13,000 years ago. This is known geologically as the Ashhurst (or Ohakea) Terrace. If you walk towards the river from the Cambridge Avenue car park at the Ashhurst Domain, just past the Canine Centre you will pass through a deep Continued on next page

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

cutting. The sides of the cutting clearly show the extent to which the valley was filled with gravel before the river eroded downwards to its present level. As it has not been subjected to a subsequent cold phase, the Ashhurst Terrace gravels are covered by only a thin layer of silt which explains the well-drained nature of Ashhurst sports fields and the stony nature of many Ashhurst garden soils.

Our district may not possess the dramatic landforms that tourists to other parts of New Zealand, but its geological history is equally fascinating and there are moves afoot to advocate The Manawatu Gorge and surrounding geological features as a UNESCO Global Geopark information boards located at points of interest.

Te Ahu a Turanga Highway Update

Construction update

It's an exciting year for construction of Te Ahu a Turanga: Manawatū Highway as the project enters its fourth year.

By the end of this year, large sections of the highway will be complete and being prepared for opening by mid-2025.

However, there's still lots construction to be done and our teams are gearing up for another huge season.

Bridge Parahaki over Manawatū River, the team continues to construct the bridge deck using the form traveller, which currently sits on Pier 1. A new concrete segment is constructed about every 10 days, and with 54 segments in total, these should be completed by the end of this year.

To help with progress, a second form traveller is being installed on Pier 2, which will enable the team to construct more sections of the bridge deck

concurrently.

Over the river at the Eco-Viaduct, the team will continue laying pre-cast concrete panels for the bridge deck, on which concrete will be poured. This bridge is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Another significant development this year will be the completion of earthworks. Since breaking ground in January 2021, our earthworks teams have moved nearly 6.5 million cubic metres of earth and are on track to finish bulk earthworks this summer.

areas where earthworks completed, pavement crews have been constructing the road surface itself, and this work will ramp up significantly throughout 2024.

To allow for the high volumes of asphalt needed to construct the pavement, an asphalt plant will be

Rain was recorded on ten days with the highest one-day rainfall of 17.5 mm on the 18th of November 2023.


The total annual rainfall is 1116.5 mm. This is above the annual average of 1031 mm.




A new and improved bus network is coming soon to Palmy and Ashhurst

Kia ora tātou

A Happy New Year one and all. During January, Ashhurst traditionally finds itself at the sharp end of the city's events with the International UCI Gravel and Tar Classic bike tour taking place back on Saturday January 20 and the Ashhurst-Pohangina Lions Small Holders Auction on the following weekend.

This year these events were enhanced by the Woodville Lions Club sell-out walks over the Te Ahu a Turanga Manawatū Tararua Highway site on **Sunday January 21**. 1500 places at \$30 a head, were snapped up for the 12km and 6km walks that left from the Ashhurst end of the highway development.

Interest in the project and its progress is certainly high. The completion date set for 2025 will bring huge flow-on benefits for Ashhurst and our wider Manawatū region.

Motorhome friendly

Looking to make the most of those benefits and the continued popularity of the Ashhurst Domain camping ground, Council wanted to set up a new motorhome dump station at the Cambridge Ave car park entrance to the sports field.

The project in support of local tourism opportunities attracted funding from MBIE and backing from the New Zealand Motorcaravan Association (NZMCA). However, the vast majority of your feedback was not in favour of the suggested location.

We listened - and are now investigating the possibility of siting it on Custom St as an extension to the current roading redevelopment.

Ashhurst Domain

One of the regular events that won't be going ahead this year is the February running of the Ashhurst-Pohangina Gold Cup race meeting at Awapuni Racecourse. The main grass track is undergoing a major upgrade, putting it out of commission for much of this year.

The Ashhurst-Pohangina Racing Club moved its meetings to Awapuni from the Domain in 1946. The old track was used for training until 1979 when the Oroua County Council bought the site for sportsgrounds. Ashhurst was incorporated into Palmerston North City in 1989 with the Council taking over responsibility for the Domain's upkeepin keeping with this heritage.

Council is undertaking a management and development plan of the Domain and is seeking your feedback on the future of the amenity.

Submissions are open until **5pm on Thursday, February 29**, with forms available on the pncc.govt.nz website and at the Ashhurst Community Library.

You'll also be able to bring your ideas and talk about them with Council staff at a community open day with free barbecue and children's activities at the Domain on Saturday February 10 between 10am - 2pm.

NZ Transport Agency/Waka Kotahi staff will also be there to talk about plans for a shared path between Ashhurst and the new Te Ahu a Turanga Manawatū Tararua Highway.

Following the submissions process, formal public consultation on the Domain development and management plan will begin in April.
