Te Ahu a Turanga Highway

At long last! Te Ahu a Turanga is open for business as the primary connection between Manawatū and Tararua districts. The road and its significant bridge structures are a feat of engineering which local residents have been keen to experience.

The newly constructed highway is 11.5 km long and takes just over ten minutes to traverse. The two key bridges are 300 metres long. The first bridge crosses the river and railway and is the largest of its type in the southern hemisphere. The second bridge is called the eco-viaduct and sits on deep piles over a sensitive wetland area with swamp maire, raupo and other native species.

Millions of tonnes of earth have been moved in the road's construction and includes the 55 metre cutting we can see from Ashhurst, filling of gullies, and embankments up to 28 metres high. The road surface (pavement) on Te Ahu a Turanga is made up of several layers, which, all combined, are 790mm thick. More than 1.8 million native plants have been planted around these construction areas and local farmlands to stabilise the earthworks and mitigate the ecological effects of construction scars the to the landscape. Ongoing weed and pest

control will manage these plantings until they are well established.

Decommissioning work on the various construction areas is still in progress. The wetland experience, which is being developed at present under the eco-viaduct, will be accessible from the shared pathway and will link to the Western Tracks which provided truck access from the Saddle Road during the construction phase. This work is expected to be completed later this year and will provide an additional link for cyclists and walkers.

The scenic lookout points on the highway have been busy as the public checks out the views and artworks which are now revealed. The old Gorge car park has been transformed from a bridge construction site into a landscaped reserve with native trees, plants and sculptured pathways encouraging further exploration.

Parking and toilet facilities are already in place to cater for visitors. Information panels about the artwork and bridge specifications are in the process of being installed. The shared path snakes through the reserve, loops under the bridge and rises via an easy incline or steps to emerge on the bridge with its breathtaking view into the mouth of the Gorge. Further artwork and a lookout area at the centre of the bridge across the river and railway is complete and already includes detailed information panels about the work.

I'd like to begin with a congratulations to our SkyTower team who placed first in the 2-5 member fundraising category by raising a staggering \$16,919! They couldn't have done it without the support from this community and once again shows your fire brigade punching well above its weight nationally. Well done my dudes!

This month I'd like to reiterate some of the basics of fire safety; if you're going to burn candles, incense, sage etc please please *please* burn them under supervision and certainly don't leave the house without putting them out first! It kind of defeats the calming and spiritual aspects of the practice if your house is smouldering on the ground.

Also remember the "metre from the heater" rule. Have a clear area of one metre around any heating source to prevent fires. Drying washing within close proximity is prevalent during these colder months so please be careful. Don't stack wood right next to your fire too. During my fire investigator course my scenario turned out to have been started by a towel draped over a heater. So, if FENZ are training its Investigators to look for this exact cause then you can assume it's a common cause of house fires!

Ashhurst School Bus Protest

central government is looking at discontinuing our high school bus service from Ashhurst to Palmerston We North currently have approximately 185 students on six buses going to seven high schools in Palmerston North.

As I write this we are waiting on the final decision on the fate of this service at the end of term two.

Mayor Grant Smith has also been in contact with central government on received behalf. and our correspondence back last week which was not promising.

In light of this, a group of concerned parents have organized a public protest. This will take place on Friday, 11th July from 8.00 am at the Ashhurst Domain carpark (along Cambridge Avenue). So we are ready to go if the final decision is not favourable. We hope to be finished up at 10.00 am, if anyone wishes to stay on they can. There are a number of issues arising with the removal of these buses. The obvious one-our rangatahi will not get to school!

The big impact will be on our students from single parent/caregiver households, from low income whanau and those whose parents have disabilities that prohibit them from driving.

Parents/caregivers in work will be affected-they will now be expected to take time from their workdays to transport kids to and from school. For a sitting government that has such a strong focus on school attendance and people in employment, this is a move which will create barriers to both for our community.

The opening of the new Ashhurst-Woodville Road (Te Ahu a Turanga), which cost \$824 million to complete, has already caused traffic chaos mere minutes down the road. I'm sure many of us have experienced the increased pressure attempting to leave and enter Ashhurst via the Napier Road turnoff. At peak times this could become a massive issue. Parents having to transport students will be an increased pressure on traffic to, from and through Palmerston North as parents drop off (and pick up) students at schools. This has the potential to affect more than just our community.

Ashhurst School Bus Protest

Our public bus service will be put from the centre of Ashhurst. under pressure by students needing to use it-disrupting the commute of those who use this service and potentially cutting off those with disabilities and our elderly from their connection to Palmerston North.

This is a breach of the Ministry of Education's own rules around providing this service.

'The student must be enrolled at the nearest state or state-integrated school they can enroll at' (for us, this is Freyburg). They will not be providing a bus service to this school.

'The student must live more than a certain distance from the school or kura'

Students must be 4.8km (Years 9-13) from their school or kura. Freyburg High School is a 13.7km trip

'The student must not have access to public transport' We currently have only one public bus which travels from Ashhurst to the Main street terminal. This bus seats a maximum of 55 people. Every school requires a connecting bus. This is not a suitable alternative.

The ministry has attempted to shift responsibility to Horizons regional council, who have categorically stated that they can not provide this service. Essentially throwing them under the bus (pun intended) over their decision.

In summary-this is a disastrous decision which will have negative effects on our community. Please join us on Friday, July 11th, to make your voice heard.

Some stats for you from our A.G.M.:

the local property market. In the hospitality sector, a drop in trade may be expected as these temporary construction workers depart. However, the scenic and recreation attractions of the Gorge walks, Western Gateway reserve and shared path may provide another source of customers into and around Ashhurst.

The barrier of no shared path crossing of the Manawatū River is a problem at present. This has been compounded by last month's action to increase the speed limit on the bridge 100 kph without any back to consideration of the safetv implications.

A shared path crossing of the river was a requirement of the consent process for the new highway. The proposal of a clip-on pathway to the bridge was abandoned when test bore results raised bridge stability issues if additional weight was added to one side. An initial design for a separate new shared path bridge came with a price tag of \$37 million. This was quietly shelved and a recent update from NZTA lists a revised process and timeline. A separate shared cycle and pedestrian bridge is still envisaged with detailed design to be confirmed in late 2026, and the bridge constructed and open by the end of 2027.

Current advice from NZTA suggests cyclists and pedestrians travel by motor vehicles and proceed from the new Western Gateway parking area. Motorists are advised to reduce speed to 40 kph if cyclists or pedestrians are on the bridge.

Commuters to the city or Massey will be aware of the traffic bottleneck which now exists on the SH3/ Cambridge Avenue intersection. There are calls for a roundabout or slip lanes to alleviate these congestion problems The need peak times. to at

accommodate heavy trucks from the highway to Feilding and northern destinations is a complicating factor. The price tag for another roundabout, another railway crossing and highway connecting infrastructure makes this unlikely in the short term.

Council activity in Ashhurst includes ongoing repairs to trip hazard footpaths. A tidy up of Wyndham Street and a rough seal over the infrastructure upgrades is still in progress. Resurfacing of the roundabout was completed over two days, but the work generated some traffic disruption while it was in progress.

The Ashhurst Domain Management Plan has reopened for the longer legislated consultation process of two months. Submission documents can be accessed from the library or online and close on 1st August. Simple questions ask for your views on the Domain's revised name, signage, bush and wetland development, natural burial site, and enabling licenced food trucks into the reserve.

The review of the school bus service is due to be announced. This could affect more than 200 students who travel by school bus to city schools and may now be deemed as 'ineligible' for this service. The Ministry of Education believes that public transport and parents' pockets will instead manage to deliver our youth to and from their schools. Horizons Regional Council has rejected a request to inject \$140,000 to expand their bus services to accommodate school transport needs and believe it a "cost-shifting exercise" by the government. Parents are becoming more vocal and active as they contemplate the cost and difficulty of getting their children to school. Public protest action is scheduled for Friday, 11th July.

mostly resting during the day, in a position that reduces their visibility, becoming active at night when they do most of their feeding.

In total, New Zealand has about 25 species of stick insect but only a few of these are found in the Manawatū region. Some prefer to feed on a particular type of tree, while other species will eat the leaves of a wide range of trees, even introduced trees like eucalypts and macrocarpa. Examples of the latter are the Acanthoxyla species, such as the Prickly and Unarmed stick insects (see photos), so these are more common in people's gardens.

Stick insects of the genus Clitarchus, such as the Smooth Stick Insect (see photo), prefer to eat manuka and kanuka. This species is common in the Manawatū. But our largest stick insect, the New Zealand Giant Stick Insect (see photo), which is in the genus Argosarchus, usually likes to eat ramarama and ribbonwood. The specimen in the photo was actually found by an Ashhurst resident in her garden and is the only one I have ever seen.

An unusual feature of stick insects is that the males are much smaller and thinner than the females, so often it is the larger females that are seen. In a few species, including those in the Acanthoxyla genus, there are no males so the females are described as parthenogenic, producing offspring that are exact copies of themselves. Mature female stick insects produce eggs continuously throughout their lives, which simply drop to the ground where they remain until they hatch the following spring. The shape of the eggs is a reliable way of determining what the species is.

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Kia ora!

Well, the longest day has been and gone, Puanga at Matariki has been celebrated, school holidays are upon us, and the Te Ahu a Turanga Manawatū Tararua Highway is open to traffic.

Now it's full tilt towards the Local Body Elections in October - the most significant event on the council calendar in the latter half of the year.

Do make sure you are enrolled to vote and are aware of any meet the candidate events.

Highway Hoorah

Yes, it's finally here, and the new highway is going to be fantastic for Ashhurst. While it was a long and sometimes grumbly wait, at last Ashhurst streets have respite from heavy vehicles. The new transport corridor with its feats of engineering has attracted praise from all quarters.

With impressive large-scale Mahi Toi Māori artwork by Warren Warbrick at Ashhurst's Parahaki roundabout, Sandy Adsett at the Woodville roundabout, and its other sculptural features in-between, some have described the new highway as a drive-thru sculpture park. The wind turbines add dynamic kinetic elements to the scenic experience, but once over the highway crest travelling west, the wide-screen vista that takes in Ashhurst and the Manawatū plains is breathtaking. The city lights are just as inspiring at night.

Travelling On

Now that the Western Gateway Park beneath the approaches to the Parahaki Bridge is open to the public, be aware that on-site work is continuing. The carpark surface will eventually be upgraded from chip seal to asphalt in the coming months, while construction staff will be working in areas adjacent to the highway until later in the year.

However, residents have already noticed a change in visitor behaviour. Travellers now seem to be deliberately choosing Ashhurst as a destination instead of simply passing through. I feel the Village is perfectly poised to enjoy the best of both worlds – as a quiet residential area known for its laid-back semi-rural lifestyle but also enjoying enough visitor activity to drive additional commercial activity.

The best is yet to come with a café and discovery information centre to open at the Gateway Park. There'll also be development of the eco-walk and cycling paths connecting to the Manawatū Gorge tracks, and the possible opening up of the Old Gorge road as a walking and cycling attraction.

Electoral Boundary Brouhaha

Aware of the huge opposition to Ashhurst's proposed inclusion in a new-look Wairarapa electorate, I'm reiterating that the Palmerston North City Council has rigorously opposed any such move. Submissions to the Electoral Commission are still in the process of being considered, with the new electoral boundaries being announced in August. As Ashhurst sits within the Palmerston North City boundary, our strongly voiced desire and preferred option, is for the Village to be part of a redrawn Palmerston North electorate, failing that, staying with the Rangitikei electorate. To call it any other way defies common sense.

RECAP

I had the pleasure of attending last month's RECAP AGM, and am impressed with the scope of the organisation and those who have built it up as a terrific community asset based around practical growing skills and education. The meeting was well attended, and the vibe really positive.

Ashhurst is blessed with several great community organisations – among them the Ashhurst Pohangina Lions, Ashurst Pohangina Rugby Football Club, the Ashhurst Memorial RSA, the Ashhurst Community Trust foodbank, and the Ashhurst Pohangina Squash Club. All seem to have full and active memberships while contributing wholeheartedly to the wellbeing of Village residents.

Haere Rā

After 19 years, highly respected Ashhurst School deputy principal Kaz Giles has left to take charge of Kiwitea School. Over almost two decades, Kaz built a reputation as a passionate, empathetic and dedicated educator and is bound to be greatly missed by pupils, parents and the wider community. I offer Kaz my best wishes as she embarks on this new career venture, though it's good to know that at Kiwitea, she's still within cooee.
