## **Community Comment**

Ashhurst's ability to support a strong protest at a public meeting has not diminished. More than 150 people from Ashhurst, Pohangina Valley, Rongotea, Shannon and other school bus routes in the region turned up to voice their concerns to Ministry of Education officials. Tangi Utikere, Member of Parliament for Palmerston North, had organised the meeting to hear the concerns of parents and caregivers threatened with loss of school bus transport for their youth.

Utikere opened the meeting with a brief overview before speakers Palmerston North City Council, Horizons and high schools expressed their concerns. James Meffan, the Ministry's manager of school transport defended the review process which has now begun in the Manawatū. There are 25 bus routes serving 15 schools in this review. The Ministry's policy is to provide a bus service only where public transport is not available, and only for students to their closest school. Public questions and heart-felt statements followed.

In Ashhurst alone, there are eight buses moving over 150 students to schools in the city. If the service was to be cut, the public transport does not have capacity, and of more concern, their teenagers would be dropped off at the central bus terminal beside the law courts. Any cost increase of bus services would be passed on to users and ratepayers.

No decisions have been made as yet, but any loss of school bus routes can only result in reduced school attendance and more costs for parents.

The upgrade of the road surface around the Napier Road – Cambridge Avenue intersection is almost complete with extensive traffic control and delays required. On the other side of the Gorge, the new Woodville roundabout will be stitched into local roads over the next five weeks. Associated road closures will require heavy traffic to take the detour over the Pahiatua Track and should bring some peace and quiet to the Ashhurst streets.

New Zealand Transport Agency is following government demands to consult on raising speed limits on New Zealand roads. Napier Road, from the edge of the city to Whakarongo is proposed to be raised from its existing 80 kph to 100 kph. This would include the dangerous intersection at Roberts Line, James Line and beside the school at Stony Creek Road.

Of greater concern to Ashhurst, is the proposal to increase the speed to 100 kph across the Manawatū bridge below the Domain. Pedestrians and cyclists have a narrow shoulder on the bridge with inadequate handrails and must compete with cars and trucks on this highway. By mid-year Te Ahu a Turanga will be open for business and 10,000 vehicles a day (?!) will be using the route. In addition, the shared path will introduce a route to attract more walkers and cyclists to use this short one km stretch of highway.

While most of us can foresee the problems ahead, it appears that New Zealand Transport Agency will need to hear your views via their consultation portal before stopping this madness. A web search for 'New Zealand Transport Agency speed consultation Manawatū' will direct you to the short survey to lodge your concerns by the deadline of 13th March.

Of course, a new shared path bridge over the river, as required under the

construction conditions of the new highway, would alleviate these problems. Provisional costs and new government directions have stalled further work. An Zealand Transport Agency spokesperson advised that they are "working on a delivery programme for the procurement, design, consenting and construction of the Shared Use Path." This could take over two years to complete. New Zealand Transport Agency is working with Councils to mitigate any safety concerns.

Late news: Palmerston North City Council consultation on the future management of Palmy's water

Palmerston North City Council has opened the consultation process on how the city's water infrastructure is managed in the future with a closing date of 30th March 2025. Their preferred option is "a water organisation jointly owned by Palmerston North City Council, Horowhenua, Manawatū and Kāpiti Coast District Councils". Other options are the status quo, or a larger regional entity involving up to six Councils. The new organisation would manage the water services of all involved regions and could take on a greater debt burden than is possible at present. A 'user-pays' system informed by water meters may be introduced to fairly spread the costs. More details and consultation options are available from the Palmerston North City Council site, under the menu option of 'Participate Palmy', or at your local library.

**Food Bank Update** 

Further to the last article, I omitted to thank our funding donors for the alterations at the Methodist Hall. Sincere thanks go to Meridian Energy for funding the storage cabinets and the Ashhurst Pohangina Lions Club for funding the building alterations. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

The Hamper Group did a great job last year, distributing 27 Christmas hampers to families nominated by members of our community. To raise funds for this, RECAP held a stall and raffles—at various locations—raising just under \$700; the Otangaki Lodge donated \$100 and the Ashhurst Pohangina Lions Club gave \$1,000. We provide free rescued kai to people in the Ashhurst/Pohangina area each Tuesday from 3.15 pm-4.15 pm from the back room of the Ashhurst Library.

If the weather is good—please queue outside. If it is raining you are able to queue inside the library.

Depending on donations, some weeks we are able to serve anyone who comes no questions asked. On weeks where donations are low we need to see a current community services card to access kai. We post on Facebook/RECAP Community Kai at approximately 2.30 pm Tuesday to let you know.

You are able to come through and pick up what you need from what has been donated that week. Some items have limits so please read the signage.

Unfortunately we can no longer set aside bags for a later pick up. And only one bag per whānau, please. We can also no longer offer more than one bag for those picking up on behalf.

Kids and teenagers are not allowed to pick up kai unless a parent or caregiver has contacted us (you only need to do this once and we will note their name down) and on the weeks where a



## Te Ahu a Turanga Update

It's going to be a busy month at both the Ashhurst and Woodville ends of Te Ahu a Turanga: Manawatū Tararua Highway, as construction teams start to connect the new roundabouts to the existing roads.

While the roundabout at the Ashhurst end is largely complete, the tie-ins to Fitzherbert East Road (State Highway 57) and Napier Road (State Highway 3) need to be completed before it can be opened to traffic.

This will mean some disruption for those travelling on those roads over the next few weeks while this work is with stop/go completed, management in place for periods of time.

This is because parts of those roads that link to the roundabout first need to be removed and rebuilt to ensure a smooth transition to the new road.

After this work is completed in early April, traffic will start using the roundabout, which will replace the existing corner at Fitzherbert and Napier Roads.

Meanwhile at the Woodville end, a full

road closure began in February on parts of Woodlands Road and Vogel Street (SH3) while the team completes the tiein to the eastern roundabout.

There are detours in place for light vehicles (Saddle Road) and heavy (Pahiatua Track), however vehicles vehicles up to 30 tonnes in weight can use the Saddle Road detour as they are able to travel across the weight restricted bridge on Oxford Road in Woodville.

The town of Woodville remains open during the closure, so if you're planning to visit family or friends, or stop at one of their businesses, you can do so.

After this work is completed by late March, traffic will start using this roundabout, which will give motorists a taste of driving the new highway. However, they will have to wait a few more months to drive the full alignment.

The project is on track for opening mid-2025, with more than 98% of the structural asphalt completed.

On top of this goes a final surfacing layer called stone mastic asphalt, which

## Te Ahu a Turanga Update

is 30% complete and on track to be finished by early May.

Most of the earthworks were completed by early 2024, but there is one small 100-metre section between Parahaki Bridge and Eco-Viaduct that is still being completed.

This section involves building a GRS (geo-synthetic reinforced slope) wall, which is a type of retaining wall. Once this is completed about mid-March, the pavements crews can complete the road surface for this section.

Teams working on the major bridges are busy completing the finishing works, which are the minor features such as barriers and balustrades. At Eco-Viaduct, the team are expected to finish installing these by early April.

On Parahaki Bridge over the Manawatū River, the team is completing the viewing platform, which sits on the eastern side and offers stunning views down Te Āpiti - Manawatū Gorge.

They're also starting to remove the temporary bridge that was installed in early 2021 to allow construction of the structure.

The finishing works on Parahaki Bridge are on track for completion by May.

# GLIMPSE

Kia ora,

The year is getting well into its stride, with the city's summer events programme in full swing. We've enjoyed Lunar New Year, Waitangi Day and the annual Festival of Cultures at Te Marae o Hine/the Square, as well as Explore Esplanade Day and Summer Shakespeare in the Victoria Esplanade.

March is Heritage Month and City Library are organising and presenting a week of talks, walks, tours, recollections and exhibitions along with other heritage-related events taking place throughout the month. This includes a talk on the Ashhurst cemetery with local historian Leanne Hickman on Central Library's second floor on Tuesday March 11, 1-2 pm. Further details are on the citylibrary.pncc.govt.nz website.

The NZ Rural Games descended on Te Marae o Hine/The Square over March 7, 8, & 9, while Central District Field Days will be a big draw at Manfeild from March 13 -15.

For the last event on the March calendar, it's back to The Square for the Holi Festival of Colours on Friday March 21. Then, the end of Daylight Saving on Sunday April 6 officially brings the curtain down on summer. I hope you managed to get out and enjoy some of these mostly free outdoor activities.

#### **Ashhurst Domain**

During December and January, the Ashhurst Domain camping ground catered for well over 700 visitors. These numbers are down on the previous year, but this is probably due to the less than friendly camping weather over much of the earlier months.

In the meantime, public submissions on the updates proposed in the draft reserve management plan for Ashhurst Domain closed during the first week of March. The existing plan has been in place for 30 years, and the update outlines activities, management, bush restoration and the Domain's future development. This includes a stronger partnership with mana whenua Rangitāne to be reflected in a name change to Ōtangaki-Ashhurst Domain along with the introduction of a natural eco-friendly burial area on the lower terraces.

Thanks to all those who turned out to the Domain open day last month, with a good number of written submissions received by the close-off date. Your feedback and ideas are appreciated.

#### **Speed Limit Changes**

Consultation about the reversal of speed limits that will affect Ashhurst folk are taking place with NZTA. Any changes will come into effect on July 1, and will specifically affect a kilometre length of highway across the Ashhurst Ōtangaki Bridge and a section at the city end of Napier Rd. It's proposed the speed limits be increased from 80kph to 100kph. Submissions about these proposed changes close on Thursday March 13.

#### **School Buses**

There is understandable community concern around the Ministry of Education's proposal to cut Ashhurst school bus services. This could affect some 380-odd Ashhurst intermediate and secondary school students, who would then have to rely on a Horizons public commuter service that has neither school-friendly schedules nor the capacity to cope with such numbers. A well-attended public meeting with city MP Tangi Utikere and city councillors was held about this last month at the Village Valley Centre, while a petition aiming for 1000+ signatures protesting the proposal is available on the change.org website.

#### **Council Consultations**

This month there will be two major consultations. The first is on the future of managing the city's water, with us proposing a joint council water organisation. This is a decision that will affect you for decades so make sure you have your say at pncc.govt.nz/localwater by 4pm March 30. The other consultation us our submissions on our 2025-26 Annual Budget. Details about the submissions should be on the pncc.govt.nz website by now.

#### Summer Water Use

After an indifferent start, it's been a hot old summer so far. For the fifth year, we've implemented our successful voluntary Summer Water Use guidelines as a way of avoiding mandatory water restrictions and promoting voluntary conservation measures.

The guidelines encourage residents to use water responsibly during the summer months by watering lawns and gardens only every second day between 7pm - 9pm, with odd house numbers irrigating on odd days and vice versa. Thank you again for your cooperation. It means we've avoided any tougher restrictions so far.

#### Meet the Mayor


## **Ashhurst Rainfall**
