Community Comment

The reseal of various streets in Ashhurst is yet to occur, but the preparation work to properly repair pot holes and damaged roads in the village is well advanced. Do take note of the restricted speed limits and road cones at various locations, which warn of loose gravel and its associated loss of traction.

The underground infrastructure for stormwater and water main upgrades has begun in Wyndham Street. More road cones and traffic diversions when men are at work. Custom Street is closed to all but resident's vehicles while the services and road construction there is underway. There has been a long sequence of workmen installing stormwater, water wastewater services. and Telecommunication channels are being laid at present before the footpath and road paving is laid down.

The Durham Street Park now has some extra fencing and new trees planted. The fencing and bollards were installed to stop the cars from using the grass area as a skid track. The new avenue of trees will provide some much needed shelter from wind and sun in this weather exposed area of Ashhurst.

We get regular reports about the progress of the new Te Ahu a Turanga highway over the hill. With much of the extensive earthworks completed, the focus of work has moved to the foundation road and pavement construction. However, words don't properly describe the scale of the project and associated construction of the bridges required. A site visit and closer view from the Gorge walking track and car park provides a better idea of the work underway for the main bridge over the river and railway. The complex jigsaw puzzle of the "form traveller" reveals how the bridge will grow out alternately in sections each side of each pier until it joins its counterpart in the middle of the span. A completed portion of the bridge on the near side presents a final view of the bridge's cross section.

The natural world of spring and trees in blossom has advanced to the later flowering fruit trees. The birds and bees have been enjoying their diet of cherry and kowhai. We are also able to enjoy the spectacle of colour and scents in the air which brighten our days, as we emerge out from our indoor days of winter cold.

Our focus at the Ashhurst Food Bank is to provide our customers with pantry staples that form the basis of a nutritious diet and part of this is freeing up funds for food by also providing other household basics. This year we have seen an average of nine families per week, which is 50% more than last year's average, and have impacted approximately 32 different families over the last nine months.

Kia ora Ashhurst. Today I'll be talking about lithium-ion batteries. These lithium-ion batteries days, are everywhere. In phones, laptops, power tools, and electric cars. They are light, compact, and long-lasting, but can be a fire hazard if they are damaged, mishandled, or improperly disposed of.

If damaged, incorrectly charged or exposed to extreme heat they can undergo thermal runaway. This is when the cells rupture, giving off toxic, explosive gas and can lead to the creation of an intense, self-sufficient fire which can be very hard to extinguish.


But doing some simple things will reduce the risk of fire: only using the manufacturers charger, unplugging after charging, charging away from

combustible materials and checking the condition of the battery all minimise the risk of fire.

The inn and restaurant currently operate from Wednesday to Sunday from 11am and day dependent closing times up to midnight on Fridays and Saturdays.



section by section.

The segments are made up of concrete that is poured in situ, or in place, rather than being precast and then lifted into position. This is because the segments would be too heavy to be lifted by crane.

The concrete is poured into frames, which are supported by the form traveller. These frames form the shape of the box girder.

After one segment is completed, the form traveller moves along and the next segment is poured. This is then repeated on the opposite site of the pier, resulting in the superstructure being 'balanced'.

The segments are reinforced with steel to give them extra strength.

Eventually, segments radiating out from one pier will be connected with those from the next pier.

In total, 54 segments will be constructed, using a total of 6,000 cubic metres of concrete.

Each segment takes up to ten days to complete, and the team aims to have about six completed by the end of 2023.

Early in 2024, a second form traveller will be installed on pier 2, enabling more segments to be constructed at the same time.

Project staff transform Bunnythorpe School grounds

> The trees and shrubs planted at the school were all donated by Kauri Park, which is the main plant supplier for Te Ahu a Turanga.

My role in this process is to ensure the children are safe during this process and that the company completing the project is acting in a safe manner.



With the General Election done and dusted, we can now look forward to making the most of 2023's last stanza.

Spring is still playing tag with us weatherwise, but hopefully things will settle down as Council contractors get stuck into the 'road works season'.

Fine weather and drier conditions provide the best and most lasting bang for Council's road-working buck, with Ashhurst in for its fair share of infrastructural upgrades.

Submissions on the Cambridge Ave motorhome dump station proposal have now closed and are under consideration.

On the Black Stuff

Residents should have received information about the road resealing programme that is already affecting a number of streets around the Village.

Davis Rd, around Lincoln Park, Oak Cres, Petes Way, and Pohangina Rd along with Wyndham St and Custom St are undergoing reconstruction. To save travel time, it may be best to avoid these streets during weekdays – unless of course you live or have business there.

While contractors hope to keep the works on schedule, be aware that any untoward weather-related events could disrupt the timetable. Details of the full roadworks programme are on the pncc.govt.nz website.

The Pipes are Calling

Comprehensive stormwater and water mains renewal work has commenced on Wyndham St. It's a big job that's not expected to be completed before the end of January 2024.

Between 6.30am and 7pm during the week, the road will be closed to through traffic and down to one lane with 30kph speed restrictions. Contractors also ask residents not to park vehicles on Wyndam St to optimise the available workspace and to minimise congestion.

At this stage of the project water connections won't be affected, but householders will be notified in advance if the supply needs to be turned off temporarily.

There will be a break in the work over the Christmas-New Year holiday period.

Customising Custom St

You may have noticed that the long-awaited upgrade to Custom St is underway.

The drainage trench work that closed the street's southern end and affected the rail crossing was the first part of a project that will see concrete footpaths, driveway access, curbing and channelling completed.
