Community Comment

High school students and their parents have some good news at last, with a decision that the school bus service will remain... for now! The Ministry of Education has been reviewing the bus service which ferries the majority of an estimated 250 students to the city's high schools each day. The 100-year-old transport policy for education appears out of step with reality. It is being used to claim that existing users are ineligible because a public bus service exists, despite its inability to meet demand. Five existing bus services between Ashhurst and the city's high schools will remain for now as a transitional service. An updated final decision is forecast to be released in Term 1, 2026. A combination of ongoing public opposition, and political fallout in an election year may extend these transitional arrangements.

The City Council has adopted the revised management plan for the Otangaki—Ashhurst Domain which has been under consultation in past months. The public have generally supported ongoing development of the Domain, while retaining the 'off the

beaten track' nature of this reserve. Some of the existing leased grazing land may be reclaimed for community, or ecological development initiatives. There was overall support for a natural burial site on the high ground of the lower terrace. A more detailed site investigation of the proposed burial site is required, with alternative locations added if needed.

Development of the campground area is ongoing. Improvements of drainage and vehicle tracks have reduced damage to the grass, which turned wet and muddy in the wet season. The formal campground area has been extended to the look out point which views the wetland, river, railway bridge and mountains. A new native planting has been added on this point with seating to enjoy the view. Raised gardens have been installed to delineate the camping area from the car park. Cooperative activities of Council officers, Domain staff and campers has established a productive vegetable garden here to support those with tight budgeting constraints.

Don't forget your vote in local body elections. There is a polling station at

> the Ashhurst Library in which to deliver your vote. Voting deadline midday, Saturday October.

Book Review: Stone Yard Devotional

Stone Yard Devotional by Charlotte Wood.

This is the story of one woman's flight from everyday life after a marriage breakup and her own emotional breakdown. No. it's not especially miserable or depressing but it will make you ponder on what is important in life —What is forgiveness and can anyone be truly good?

Abandoning her city life, she returns to her childhood town to join a religious community hidden away in

Monaro. She has no religion herself but finds herself living in this reclusive place alongside the resident nuns.

Grief plays a large part in her emotional state and while staying there she often thinks of her mother, whose death preys on her mind. The retreat is not without its own dramas a plague of mice causes lots of damage and it is a constant battle to get rid of the infestation. A visitor to the monastery turns out to be

someone from her past who brings about long forgotten feelings of regret and guilt.

Days are spent cooking, cleaning, feeding animals and generally helping the nuns run the retreat. She does not take part in prayers and other religious or church activities but she observes

and is respectful of the everyday prayers and services. These daily rituals are healing and help with her reflections on the past and the grief she has been dealing with.

I found this a meditative and very moving book by one of Australia's best loved writers. Highly recommended.

New Zealand Bird of the Year

The votes have been counted and the results are in. The winner of Bird of the Year 2025 is the Kārearea— the New Zealand falcon. A bird of prey that is capable of flying at speeds of up to 200 km/h, and can catch prey larger than itself.

The New Zealand Falcon is classed as being *in serious trouble*. That means it needs our help.

We are lucky in Ashhurst in that there have been sightings in our Village, with a family being seen in the Ashhurst Domain. They are usually ground nesting, so are at real risk of predation from introduced predators.

We are coming up to nesting season. Last year my dog was dive-bombed in the Domain by a falcon, so she was quickly put on lead. I found out there was a nest so she was protecting her young. So, if you walk you dog in the Domain, keep an eye out for falcons, and keep your dog on lead when in their vicinity.

You could also put a post up on Ashhurst Chat, to let other dog owners know to be careful, and also let the photographers know where they might get photos.

Peripatus: The New Zealand Velvet Worm

Earlier this year it was announced that the New Zealand Velvet Worm, also known as *Peripatus* or Ngaokeoke, had been voted the Bug of the Year 2025. This is a very

unusual organism that actually looks more like a caterpillar than a worm, with about 15 pairs of stumpy legs. But it is neither a caterpillar nor a worm. It

Peripatus: The New Zealand Velvet Worm

has been called a living fossil, as it has changed little in the last 500 million years (Cambrian Period).



There are actually around 200 species of Peripatus worldwide, with up to 30 of those being native to New Zealand. However, less than a third of the New Zealand species have been officially described. Although rarely seen, they can be found in forests throughout much of the country. Interestingly, different species may vary in terms of the number of legs they have, either 14, 15 or 16 pairs. I have twice found specimens in the Ashhurst Domain forest (see photos) but it is not known what the species is in this area.

Peripatus are typically around 20-50 mm in length and have velvety skin (hence the name Velvet Worm) that is

prone to drying out. Because of this, they are mostly found in cool, shady, moist environments, such as in rotting wood or under leaves and other debris ground. Peripatus predators, hunting at night when conditions are cool. When they sense suitable prey nearby, they squirt jets of sticky fluid that immobilises the prey.



unusual feature of Peripatus, including all those found in the North Island, is that they give birth to live young. However, a few species found in the South Island ranges are known to lay eggs. Females are thought to produce around 10-20 offspring each year. Unfortunately, populations of Peripatus in New Zealand are thought to be declining, probably due mostly to loss of suitable habitat.

Book Review: *Jacinda Ardern*

researched study of our Prime Minister is packed full of political highlights and personalities.

Jacinda Adern never wanted to be prime minister and didn't consider it seriously until the possibility was only seven weeks away, in 2017. Most of us are glad she did and it seems the Labour party wanted her to lead before she actually wanted it for herself.

She certainly has become a new kind of leader, kind being part of her "signature" style. First elected in 2008, she was the youngest sitting MP and was to become our youngest serving Prime Minister at 37. The fact that she also became the first Prime Minister to give birth in office, shortly after election, was another groundbreaking event

This bio does give us some interesting facts on Jacinda's early life growing up in Murupara and Morrinsville as a child. She shone at school and on the School Council showed early signs of policital leanings. At Morrinsville College she was voted the girl most likely to become Prime Minister.

The Adern family were Mormons and their two daughters were brought up

in that way of life, but Jacinda was eventually to move away from the church, her beliefs were not compatible with the traditions of that church.

I would have liked to learn more of the real person in this bio, and maybe a little less of the political details, but even so there is much of general interest to the reader. In particular, a chapter on the Christchurch shooting tragedy in March 2019 and the extraordinary events that followed. This terrible event turned out to be a highlight of Jacinda's leadership and her response to it was admired worldwide.

A chapter on Working Motherhood was one I really enjoyed, with a focus on her partnership with Clarke Gayford and the birth of Neve. No-one in the Labour party press team had experience in handling of a Prime Minister's pregnancy because no Prime Minister had ever been pregnant while in office before.

"Adern has become as global icon of empathetic leadership, both a credit to her and an indictment on her international peers"—says the author and I don't think many would disagree.


Ashhurst Rainfall
