Art and Sculpture on the New Highway

The interpretive signage has now been installed at various locations on Te Ahu a Turanga Highway to help explain the art and sculptures on the roundabouts and lookouts. Take some time to detour off the highway to the Western Gateway car park to check out progress. There is an easily accessible path for access to the Parahaki Bridge, its

viewing area into the Gorge, and an overview of the art beside the highway.

The artists' explanations and meanings related to these artworks on the western side of the highway have kindly been provided by staff from this NZTA project and consortium.

The three main pieces of mahi toi on the western side are: the roundabout sculpture (Hine-te-iwaiwa), the aurei pin on Parahaki Bridge (Tuia Te Maunga), and the heru sculptures at the Ashhurst lookout (Tuia Te Tangata).

The overarching cultural concept of the mahi toi on the highway is he aho tangata. He aho tangata, which can be translated as the human threads that bind us, brings together the idea of relationships between people, and the physical act of traditional weaving.

Hine-te-iwaiwa





The turuturu on the Western Roundabout is named Hine-te-iwaiwa and has been created by combining two different traditional forms—a tokotoko (orator's staff) and a manaia.

A manaia sits atop a tokotoko facing skywards, looking to the Hine-te-iwaiwa star. Hine-te-iwaiwa governs over all things female, including the arts pursued by women such as raranga and whatu (weaving).

The spiral design in the groundwork is inspired by a four-part spiral carving at a Rangitāne whare, Ngā Tau e Waru Marae at Te Ore Ore, built in 1878. This spiral, named Aputa ki Wairau, has been designed to acknowledge the iwi partners and the Parahaki Trust involved in the highway project.

Tuia Te Maunga

An aurei is a large cloak pin, designed to bring two edges of the cloak together.

They were traditionally made from whale ivory or bone. When an aurei fastens a cloak, it keeps the wearer warm. As ngahere (forest) on the Tararua and Ruahine Ranges keeps the maunga warm, they can be thought of as a cloak.

Considering Te Āpiti -Manawatū Gorge as the place where two edges of a cloak

come together, the symbolic aurei on the Rangitane o Manawatu and Ngati Kauwhata. They also express the mana of the Ruahine Range.

> Heru (hair combs) are a statement of mana. They were traditionally only worn by rangatira, by men and women of high rank who had pūtiki (topknots). Heru hold pūtiki in place and were of a sign of rangatiratanga. Heru traditionally made from whalebone or wood, or from wooden teeth bound together with fibre.

I'll start with the bad news. New Zealand has recently ticked over a horrible milestone: in the last 12 months 17 people have died in avoidable house fires. That's our worst year in ten years. Fire and Emergency see a spike in house fires due to cooler temperatures and it reinforces the points I constantly nag about to you—have working smoke alarms, plug heaters directly into the wall (no multiboards) and don't dump hot ashes directly in the bin.

Now onto some better news, recently we had a big training scenario at the Ashhurst school. The scenario involved a smoke-logged building where our firefighters had to perform search and

rescue, triage and manage medical issues and ultimately extinguish the fire. Having actual students, teachers and parents playing roles added realistic pressure to the crews with myself having to manage pump operator duties and placate distraught parents at the same time! Suffice to say it was challenging but reinforced our strengths and gave us some things to work on.

Thank you to the school staff for allowing us to train there as well as to the students and parents who added realism to the scenario.

Death Without Debt New Zealand is 'dedicated to creating a future where the cost of dying doesn't add to the burden of grief' and is designed to guide people through the financial challenges surrounding death.

Facilitated by Suzanne Chelius—a local Ashhurst resident who serves on the board of RECAP and is trained as an End of Life Doula. Her aim is to empower people on the individual level to make optimal choices around end of life as well as on the societal level, to change the way we approach, talk about and plan for death.

Join us to talk freely about the financial, legal, practical but also emotional aspects of death and dying in a relaxed and friendly environment.

Community Kai update: Just a quick

message to clarify a couple of things relating to the Community Kai service.

At this service we are distributing rescued food. This means the food shared is deemed 'unsellable'. There are a multitude of reasons for this: some items simply have damaged packaging, but some items are too close to, or past, best before or use by dates.

Just for your peace of mind: when items are collected or delivered we assess them. We check the dates, if it's been frozen, what state it is in and what ingredients it contains. We do dispose of items if we believe they pose a risk if consumed or used.

I (Chris) worked in commercial kitchens for many years and was required to keep a hygiene certificate up to date. One of our volunteers is a retired nurse and her husband is a food scientist. Between us we have a very good understanding of what's safe to consume. We've even contacted manufacturers in the past to confirm the safety of certain items.

Our motto is 'If in doubt, throw it out.' And I personally don't put anything out that I wouldn't happily consume myself.

That being said, always use your own eyes, nose and common sense before consuming.

Please read the signage on the items when you pick up. With some items it is 'take at own risk' (homemade preserves and such).

Over the past five years we have only had a very small number of people who have reported back to us that an item was inedible. If you *do* notice something is wrong with an item you've collected at this service, please contact us so we can let others know.

Stoat Trapping

Mike started the Ashhurst Stoat 2009. Trapping program in conjunction with the Department of Conservation, to reduce the levels of mustelids (ferrets, stoats and weasels), rats, mice and other small pests in the Manawatū Gorge Track area, located between the Manawatū River and Tararua wind farm. DoC has provided the traps and eggs while our group has checked all 109 "DoC-200 traps regularly, removing any pests caught and replacing the eggs. Following Mike's funeral, the group met with his wife Jan, to reflect on his full and active life and what we each appreciated about him. We all agreed that Mike would want the trapping to continue. Five of us have


now become signatories to a new agreement with Department of Conservation which will cover the next five -ten years.

The graph below summarises the pest numbers found caught in the traps during the 12 month period from July 2024 to June 2025. The total number caught was 168, similar to the average annual

catch of 159 (range 111-212) in the previous 15 years or so. However, the unusual feature of the 2024-25 results, as is obvious from the graph, was the big spike in numbers at weeks 35-47 (late summer/autumn). Although the traps were checked six-weekly over this time, instead of four - five weekly, that does little to explain such a big increase in numbers.

Department of Conservation pays contractors to manage other pests such as possums in the same bush reserve. Our group is passionate about investing time for predator control so that the taonga of our native fauna and flora can be restored to how it was meant to be.

submissions on boundary changes within New Zealand coming from Ashhurst opposing this exile, it was determined to be too hard to move boundaries elsewhere to make it work. Media reports, and a recent visit to Ashhurst to meet local residents, suggest that Celia Wade-Brown, as a Green list MP living in Wairarapa, will include Ashhurst in her coverage of governmental duties. Members RECAP guided Celia around the village projects and provided some background to Ashhurst's place in regional and national democracy.

This change will only affect who we can vote for in national government elections as we migrate from Rangitikei to Wairarapa electorate. Our voting in the upcoming local body elections, such as for Palmerston North City Council or Horizons, will remain unchanged.

Nominations for local body elections have now closed. Postal voting in these elections open on 9th September and close 11th October. The Palmerston North City Council elections have four nominations for Mayor, 37 nominations for 13 Councillor positions in the general ward, and three nominations for two Councillor positions in the Māori ward. Voting papers should be in your letter box in early September.

Local residents presented their petition to repair the road works following infrastructure upgrades in Wyndham Street. The result is a holding pattern with no specified budget for

work, but they will consider options for the future.

It is a similar pattern as concerned parents of high school students await a decision on school bus transport. The key oppositions activists are also getting no updates from authorities, who will likely be scrambling to find a solution. Horizons Regional Council, who operate the public transport bus network, have ruled out adding new bus routes to service this need and have rejected using ratepayer funds to service Ministry of Education transport costs.

The Manawatū Gorge's Tawa Loop Track is now partially open, although maintenance and upgrades are still ongoing. The track is now accessed from the base of the new Parahaki Bridge and takes a zig-zag path up the hill, past the temporary car park and up the hill to Tom's Lookout. Sadly, the old path which began next to the highway and weaved its way up the banks of the creek is now closed from access. The upgraded track is expected to be completed by the end of 2025. Upper sections of the track are muddy and slippery during wet weather, so be prepared.

Meanwhile, the work on the Western Gateway Park continues below the ecoviaduct on the far side of the Parahaki Bridge. New nature walks are under construction and will be accessed from the new shared pathway, or via the construction road accessed from the

Wyndham Street upgrade back on the table

Thanks to those who joined us in our Council Chamber last month to present the petition regarding upgrades to Wyndham Street, including resealing the road, installing kerb and channel, footpaths, and drainage. Our elected members appreciated hearing your views and understood your frustration at the earlier decision to delay the upgrade following changes in government funding.

In response to the petition, elected members voted to restart the procurement process for the Wyndham Street upgrade. Council will receive a report in the coming months outlining programme and funding options. Staff will investigate whether any other projects can be delayed or re-prioritised to allow this work to happen. Elected members will vote on the next steps at that stage. We'll keep you informed through this column.

Elections updates

Ashhurst residents will vote in the Wairarapa electorate at the 2026 general election, despite 105 submissions from people wanting the village to remain in the Rangitīkei electorate or be included in Palmerston North. While the proposal proceeded despite your feedback, it was encouraging to see so many of you participate and share your views with the Electoral Commission.

This decision applies only to national elections. Local body elections happening this October will still see you voting for your Mayor and city councillors. Voting papers will arrive in your mailbox this month. Candidate information, including short videos, is available on our Council website now. The council-run Mayoral Candidate Debate will be held on Wednesday 17 September, 6.30–8.30pm at the Globe Theatre and will be livestreamed. Community-organised candidate meetings are also happening across the city.

Testing of water filtration plant

Work on the new \$1.7 million filtration plant at the Ashhurst water bore is nearing completion. It's designed to remove natural sediment such as iron and manganese, which can sometimes cause discoloured water. Specialist sand for the filters has arrived, and we're beginning testing by running water through the system while completing all electrical and instrument checks. This testing is separate from your supply, so you won't notice any changes. Once operational, we'll clean sediment from the wider Ashhurst pipe network and reservoir over a few months, after which you can expect clear water year-round. We'll keep you updated.

Palmerston North adopts milestone water plan

Council has adopted its joint Water Services Delivery Plan, developed with Horowhenua and Rangitīkei District Councils, who we're partnering with to set up a jointly owned council controlled organisation responsible for water services. The plan outlines how the three councils will deliver drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater services safely, reliably, and sustainably. It is now being submitted to Government for approval under its Local Water Done Well legislative requirements. All councils will continue to deliver services locally while working together on governance arrangements. Read more on our website.

Te Āpiti carpark hours / Tawa Loop

Thanks to the Department of Conservation for their work in reopening the Tawa Loop. The track is now open again, with some ongoing maintenance, fully reopening the Gorge Walk. We've installed signage at Te Āpiti carpark so visitors know the hours: gates will be locked overnight from 9pm to 5am during warmer months (October–April) and from 7pm to 6am during colder months (May–September).

99.2 mm of rain fell in July 2025, above the monthly long-term average of 111.39 mm.


Rain was recorded on 11 days, with the highest one-day rainfall of 27 mm on the 3rd of July.
